Message From The Provincial Grand Master

Brethren,

As is usual at this time of the year, I give a resume of where our Province currently rests.

During 2019 we have been celebrating 200 years of existence for our senior Lodge - Pomfret Lodge No 360 which meets in Northampton. This was, of course, the first time that this Province has carried out such festivities so we had no template to work from. I must congratulate all members of Pomfret who worked so hard to make a success of the year. The year commenced with a Banner Rededication and then a meeting to which all ninety-three progeny Lodges were invited. I recall that about sixty-seven were in attendance and we had a wonderful occasion with Lodge Banners being paraded. The highlight, however, was the meeting in November when the official celebrations took place. These occasions are handled by Grand Lodge and we were honoured with the presence of RW.Bro Jonathon Spence. the Deputy Grand Master. He was accompanied by his Director of Ceremonies and also VW.Bro Graham Redman, Deputy Grand Secretary. They have all

contacted me since the event to say how much they enjoyed their visit to our Province. Every member of Pomfret worked so hard to achieve the success and the Lodge was confidently and capably led by the Master, W.Bro Mark Charteress. The research work and historical presentations made by W Bro Nigel Morley were a delight to listen too. Well done Pomfret!

December saw the Installation of a new Inspector General in the Order of the Ancient and Accepted Rite - Rose Croix - when Very Illustrious Brother John Booth took over the reins from Very Illustrious Brother Tony Avery. Tony served the office for fifteen years in a wonderful manner and will, I am sure, enjoy his retirement. We all wish John Booth, a member of the Abington Craft Lodge, every success in his new role.

The hard work that everyone has been exerting to maintain and increase our overall numbers is meeting with success. In the last year, every month has shown a year on year increase and this is something of which, we



should be very proud. We are benefitting from the work of W.Bro Davis Watson and his retention/resignation committee. A number of members who were planning to leave have now been persuaded to stay, if not in their original Lodge, then by joining a different one.

We have also, as I trust you are all aware, developed the New and Young Masons Club - 'The Light Blues'. From tentative beginnings this club has now been developed in all parts of the Province. The membership numbers have rocketed beyond two hundred and all are enjoying the events. These include curry evenings, brewery trips, ten pin bowling, quizzes, Lodge visits, and many more events. Because family members are invited to attend many of these events, it helps enormously in assisting families to understand what the member has joined. The

principal advantage of the club is that new members from many different Lodges and centres, are able to meet with, and identify with, others at the same early stage of a Masonic career, It is interesting to note that in 2016 we lost between 20 and 25% of our Initiates within three years of joining. In 2017 this had reduced to between 6 and 10% and in 2018 it further reduced to between 4 and 6%. I am confident that now that the 'Light Blues Club' is gaining momentum, that loss figure will reduce even further.

Our Province continues to be the best in uniting all of the Orders that meet within our boundaries. Every head of an Order and his deputy is invited to join the Three Counties Lodge. This only meets twice each year but serves as a most important vehicle to transmit our thoughts and ideas through a united channel. We have relatively new leaders in several of the Orders. Most Excellent Grand Superintendent Jim

Boughton for the Royal Arch (Jim previously served as an Assistant Provincial Grand Master), Right Illustrious Companion Martin Wilson for Royal & Select Masters and RW.Bro Bob Stokes for the Mark Master Masons, are all relatively new appointments and all of them, together with every other Head of an Order in the Province, agree that for them to be successful, we need to have a strong Craft. I am most grateful for the support that they give to me and my team.



Appointments and promotions for next season have now being finalised. I congratulate all those who are receiving preferment. Perhaps the most vital change will be in the Provincial Office. W.Bro Mike Caseman-Jones (pictured above) will stand

down after five very successful vears as Provincial Grand Secretary. His successor will be W.Bro William Diggins. He has served as Assistant Secretary for five years and has contributed much to the success of our Province. The wonderful events that we enioved during the Tercentenary were organised by him and I have every confidence that he will continue the outstanding line of Secretaries enjoyed by the Province over many years.

Brethren, enjoy the remainder of this busy and exciting season. I look forward to meeting with you on my visits around the Province and, of course, at the Provincial meetings in May.

It was a very memorable and special evening which saw W.Bro Bob Stokes, Provincial Grand Master of the Mark Dearee in Northamptonshire and Huntingdonshire, installed into the Chair of Kina Solomon by W.Bro Tom Quinn, Provincial Grand Master of the Provincial Grand Lodge of Bedfordshire & Northamptonshire in the Royal Order of Scotland.

W.Bro Bob was initiated into Peterborough and Counties Lodge in 1990

before becoming a founder of the Richard Sandbach Lodge of Research in 1995 and a member of the Palmer Lodge of Provincial Grand Stewards in 2001. He is perhaps best known in the Craft as a Deputy Provincial Grand Director of Ceremonies from 2009 until 2013.

In this edition, I wish to highlight some of the basic principals underlying the work of a Mentor. Your Lodge Mentoring Co-ordinator may call upon you to become an assistant Mentor. It is also highly likely you will propose or second a new candidate during the course of your Masonic career, so these notes will help you.

I have therefore set out below some I hope useful advice which is also contained in the Provincial Mentoring and Education Guidance Notes.

It is the Mentor's first responsibility to ensure the new member is made to feel welcome and that he understands what is required of him.

The Mentor must be enthusiastic about Freemasonry and keen to take on the role, which may require some time to provide guidance to candidates and new members.

The Mentor's role cannot start too soon. Ideally, he should be involved from the time of the interview (or Court of Honour).

Some thought may be needed prior to initiation to make sure the candidate is aware of the time, place, dress code, costs and requirement to make a short response to his Toast.

Towards the end of the initiation ceremony, it is desirable for a Mentor to be formally introduced in Open Lodge to the candidate.

After initiation, the Mentor should be willing to sit with the new Mason in Lodge and probably retire from the Lodge with the new Mason for ceremonies above his existing rank. This can also be useful to answer the many questions an inquisitive Mason is bound to ask.

The Mentor should be aware of the resources available via Solomon, readily available Provincial documentation and the Lodge's own mentoring material.

It is recommended the Mentor should meet the new Masons on a number of occasions following the various degree ceremonies, to explain the next immediate steps and the various paths towards joining the Light Blues club, to take on ritual work and in due course holding various offices within the Lodge.

The new Mason should be appraised of the existence and progress towards joining the Holy Royal Arch to complete his third degree ceremony, this should be the first non-craft

step into other orders.

The Mentor should guide the new Masons to joining a Lodge of Instruction and encourage visiting to other Lodges, particularly to see ceremonies for which he was recently a candidate.

A mentoring programme and your support should lead to new members fully understanding and taking great enjoyment from their Freemasonry.

Finally, the Mentor should keep a close track of the new members attendance at Lodge meetings and social events. If there are periods of absence, these should be carefully followed up in a timely manner to resolve any difficulties or misunderstandings that may occur.

The Mentor is also able to rely on the support of senior members within the Lodge and Provincial Mentoring support and recovery policies, which are now well established.

Joy's Story

I am happier and more content today. Certainly. happier than I was just over a vear ago when my life seemed like it was falling apart. Thanks to the Freemasons, I have come a long way. I have a safe comfortable home, a beautiful baby and a loving family around me. My journey out of that dreadful part of my life started when, at my lowest ebb. I noticed one of the Masonic charity fridge magnets in my mum and dad's kitchen. I pleaded with my dad to call them to see if there was any way they could help me. The charity contacted a local Freemason who came to see me straight away.

Looking back, without the assistance from the Freemasons I would have had no one who knew how to represent and support me. I needed somewhere to live and was preanant, after having to flee my previous address. I also had arrears from outstanding bills as a result of the abuse and coercive control of my ex-partner. I had also lost a previous well-paid job due to the fact my ex-partner was making threats to the people in my workplace. I had to leave for their safety and my own. My workplace was where I had been confident and had self- respect, but this was taken away and I found myself in a hostel, no longer able to fund a home for myself or put down a deposit either.

I was accompanied by a Freemason to a meeting at the local Council, who offered support and to speak on my behalf. My experience had made me withdrawn and unable to trust others. I think I had become isolated and found it difficult to speak up for myself due to the abusive relationship I had been in. I felt I was disadvantaged by the Authorities who administer support due to my situation, but with the masonic backing I felt they gave me the confidence to carry on. I had come very close to giving up after making numerous phone calls to different housing officials, who assuring me they could not help.

Without the help of the Masons I would probably have continued living in a refuge/hostels as my parents did not have enough room for me to live with them and did not have any extra funds to help me either.

When I was given the keys to my new home, I felt like I was being offered the opportunity to rebuild a life for my unborn child and myself, where we could make a safe and loving home and we can look forward to enjoying life together. I attended a course run be Women's Aid that has helped a great deal as it made me aware that the things that happened to me were not my fault and I could avoid getting into similar relationships in the future.

Also, the Masonic charity and local Province stepped in with help to make my home comfortable and secure, this gave me a sense of hope.

All I wanted was for my baby to grow up knowing he had a caring family environment that supports you when times are tough.

As a single mother, I must be able to survive on the limited money, but the Masonic charity helps, and this has allowed me to start a course at the Open University. I intend to use the qualification to get back into work when the baby is a little older.

I never really appreciated what my Dad being a Freemason was all about, but my experience has taught me that its more about helping others and family coming first.

Thanks to him and all the other Freemasons, I have a new life and hope for the future.



Dr Oliver Celebrates it's Centenary

The Centenary of any Lodge is a great achievement, and the meeting of Dr Oliver Lodge No. 3964 on Friday the 25th of October 2019 at Ellindon celebrated the event in great style.

The Provincial Grand Master, RW.Bro Max Bayes, his Executive and many other distinguished Brethren were welcomed by the Master of the Lodge, W.Bro Mark Watson.

Of all the illustrious Brethren throughout the years in Freemasonry, it could be argued that The Rev Dr George Oliver is one of the most important, for it is his cautionary words on the admission of candidates that adorn many summonses, by-laws and other such Masonic artefacts.

Born on the 5th of November 1782 in Peppleworth, Nottinghamshire, the eldest son of the Rev Samuel Oliver - who initiated him into Freemasonry in 1801/2 in St Peters Lodge, Peterborough - Dr Oliver rose in the ranks of Freemasonry and became a great writer on the subject, publishing many books. The Lodge that bears his name in Peterborough was consecrated on the 23rd of September 1919 at the Cooperative Hall, Park Road.

The consecration was undertaken by The Deputy Provincial Grand Master W.Bro Thomas Horton PGD and W.Bro JG Sturton, reigning master of the Ailwyn Lodge, was installed into the Chair of the new Lodge.

A Daily Advancement

The Richard Sandbach Lodge of Research No. 9600 would like to offer this article to those keen on pursuing their 'daily advancement' of Masonic knowledge. Look out for further articles in future editions of Password.

The Liverpool Rebellion and the Wigan Grand Lodge

Most Masons will know there were once two competing forms of English Freemasonry; the 'Antients' and the 'Moderns'. The 'Antients' did not like the innovations the 'Moderns' had introduced after 1717 and wanted to return to a 'pure and ancient' form. The two Grand lodges shared an uneasy existence until the Duke of Sussex heralded in the Union of 1813.

But there was to be one last major rebellion that could have scuppered the Duke 's vision. It was to become known as 'The Liverpool Rebellion' and was to lead to 'The Grand Lodge of Ancient Free and Accepted Masons of England', also known as 'The Wigan Grand Lodge'.

In the early 1820's Liverpool was growing in wealth and influence due to the increasing worldwide demand for goods from its local industries and also its expanding seaport. The

train network was in its infancy and communications with London were stretched. The rebellion started, as these things often do, when a few important Masons in Liverpool perceived the UGLE was remote and high-handed.

In 1823 thirty-four Liverpool masons published a 'Masonic Manifesto' to air their arievances. The Duke of Sussex responded by suspending them all, which only served to draw sympathy for the rebels from some masons in neighbouring Wigan. This resulted in them jointly publishing another document; the 'Unalterable Declaration'. The Duke then attempted to appease the rebels by suspending the PGM and Deputy PGM for the Lancashire Province. But then, without warning, the UGLE withdrew the warrant of the leading rebel lodge and expelled twenty-six of their number.

This only encouraged the rebels to produce their third document: 'The Magna Carta of Masonic Freedom' which they all duly signed. They also took out advertisements in four London newspapers to ensure the UGLE got the message. They declared they were 'Antient' in persuasion

and national in ambition.

Unfortunately, their new movement was immediately in crisis when it was discovered that a senior member was embezzling funds. Financial trouble and mistrust persisted, which eventually led to the Liverpool and Wigan rebels separating. Wigan became home to The Wigan Grand Lodge' in 1838. They established a few lodges in Lancashire but by the mid-1850's, dogged by debt, internal disputes, expulsions and changing Grand Masters they would fail to achieve their national ambition and instead went into slow decline.

Eventually 'The Wigan Grand Lodge' became synonymous with just one lodge: 'The Lodge of Sincerity'. It bravely held out until 1913 at which point it decided to re-join the UGLE. Ninety years had passed since the publication of 'The Masonic Manifesto'. The dream of an 'Antients' Grand Lodge to rival the 'Moderns' was over. Theirs was to be the last serious challenge to the authority of the UGLE over English Freemasonry.

The Blue Rosette

In the 2018 promotions to Provincial Grand Rank I became a Past Provincial Assistant Grand Standard Bearer even though I have never served as a Worshipful Master. What I had received was a 'Blue Rosette Promotion', which refers to the apron decoration. This inspired me to carry out research on the significance of this Masonic apron.

I began by looking at the Entered Apprentice's apron. It is made of lambskin, pure white, without fault or stain. A deeper meaning may be applied as typifying innocence in our first hour of sacrifice when we dedicate ourselves to a way of life.

A Fellowcraft's apron is also white but with two light blue rosettes upon it. The rosette is believed to have entered Freemasonry due to the French love of the rosette to indicate achievement and status. They used the folded ribbon of the rosette to represent a rose and it first appeared in some official Masonic records in the early 1800s.

The Master Mason's apron is also white but has three light blue rosettes upon it. The symbolic meaning of the three rosettes is a reminder that three rule a Lodge.

The light blue colour is that of Cambridge University, and that used by Parliament when fighting King Charles. It is also closely related to the colour of the Virgin Mary. In many statues of her she is seen wearing a crown of seven stars on her head and a cloak of light blue.

When a Mason becomes a Worshipful Master the rosettes are replaced by the three Tau's or Levels to denote the overseer, whose job it is to check the building is level. After some years as a Past Master he may receive a promotion to Provincial Grand Rank. The three Tau's are retained but the decoration on the apron is now a dark blue. This is also the colour of Oxford University, and that used by the Royalist cause during the English Civil War. Accordingly, the dark

other hand, represents the Master Mason, whose duty it is to obey.

When a Master Mason who has never been Worshipful Master receives a Provincial Grand Rank the three rosettes on the apron become dark blue in colour, thus the term 'Blue Rosette Promotion'. There are only a few of these promotions each year, mostly to those who have given long service as a lodge officer or general service to Freemasonry and the community. I was honoured to be one of just nine such promotions in 2018.

It is with great sadness that we announce the passing of W.Bro Dr John Robert (Bob) Beeton PJGD to the Grand Lodge above on Tuesday the 24th of September 2019.
W.Bro Bob was the Senior Group Officer for Peterborough for many years. He was a very active, well-liked and respected Freemason throughout the Province and beyond.
Only last year, Bob received his Golden Jubilee certificate from the Provincial Grand Master, RWBro Max Bayes.

Bob is survived by his wife, Annette; his two daughters, Sandra and Claire; his sonin-law, James; and his arandson Fin.

Bob's family came from Yaxley near Peterborough where his father ran a successful haulage business. After leaving junior school, Bob was enrolled as a boarder at Kimbolton School where he stayed until 1957. Upon leaving, Bob went to Durham University where he studied and qualified as a doctor; he also met Annette there.

Atter university, Bob moved to Norwich where he lived for several years before returning to Peterborough. He joined a successful GP partnership where he became senior partner, a role he performed until retirement. During that time Bob was appointed as the team doctor for Peterborough United Football Club. He enjoyed many Saturday afternoons watching "The Posh" in their heyday.

Bob was a keen sportsman and played cricket for Peterborough Town Cricket Club and Milton & Longthorpe Cricket Club. He was also a past captain of Peterborough Milton Golf Club where he continued to play up until his passing. Bob was a Lewis. He was initiated into Old Kimboltonians' Lodge No. 7204 in May 1968, later joining Fitzwilliam Lodge No. 2533 in 1984. Interestingly, neither of these lodges were his father's.
Bob was also a member of the Palmer Lodge of Provincial Grand Stewards No. 8995, Northants & Hunts Lodge of Installed Masters No. 3422, and Three Counties Lodge No.

E Comp Bob was exalted into the Holy Royal Arch in

Chicheley Chapter No. 607 in April 1984 subsequently becoming MEZ in 1991 and joining Chapter of First Principals No. 3422 in 1999. Bob was promoted to Grand Rank in both Craft and Holy Royal Arch. He was a Group Officer for Peterborough for several years, eventually becoming the Senior Group Officer.
