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Message From The Provincial Grand Master

Brethren,

As I write this in early August I hope that you are all enjoying a well-earned rest. Much as we love our Freemasonry I believe that a summer break is essential as we then commence again in September with renewed vigour.

You will all know of my concerns about membership numbers and I am pleased to report that we continue to see a year on year increase in our net numbers. I consider that we have good systems in place to deal with applications to join us and this should ensure that only the suitable men are accepted. My main concern has always been regarding resignations and I believe that if all of us work at reducing the number of these, we will see our numbers arow even more rapidly. During the coming season every Lodge will maintain a register, quietly completed by the Assistant Secretary during

the meeting, and this will give an early warning about members who are not attending. Contact can then be made by an appropriate brother to ascertain if there is a problem. I have also appointed W Bro David Watson, Provincial Grand Treasurer, to head a small team of experienced brethren who will be alerted by a Lodge when there is a resignation or a strong suspicion that one may be imminent. We need to know why a man wishes to resign and I am sure that in many cases a loss may be averted. We need the help of everyone in this matter and we should all be on the look out for a brother who appears not to be enjoying what we have to offer

I am very pleased to report that a Lodge that has suffered membership losses in recent years and was in serious danger of closing has now been rejuvenated and has great hopes for the future. St Johns Lodge which meets in

Northampton, has not been able to recruit new members for a good number of years and was suffering from an aging membership. You will appreciate that in our whole history, since 1798, we have never had the erasure of a Lodge in our Province. Clearly, I did not want St Johns to be the first, particularly as they are due to celebrate their centenary in 2019. An appeal was made to members of other Lodges within the Province and there are now around fifteen new joining members. They have met on several occasions during the summer to get to know each other and everyone is now looking forward to the new season with great excitement.

I hope that most of the Lodges have held some sort of summer function during this extremely hot weather that we have been enjoying. I consider that the social side of Masonry is very important. Even in Lodges that meet six or seven times during a masonic season, it can

take several years for a new member to get to know his co-members well. A social event makes this much easier and also involves our families which is so important. Social events are also a very simple way to raise some charitable funds and that is so important as we are now in Festival.

Because several of our Lodges had built up funds during the period since the last Festival, they were able to pay over substantial amounts to the 2024 fund. This gave us a magnificent start, but

could also lead to a little complacency. We did have a great start but now the real hard work must begin. I urge you all to support your Charity Steward to ensure that your Lodge reaches its target and that we get to 2024 with a resounding success.

Brethren, I am immensely proud of our Province and in so many ways we set examples to others. We have successfully addressed the building problems that beset so many Provinces and we are often asked for advice. We have a good membership record with small overall increases in numbers after decades of decline. We recruit quality members and I am sure that we can all work hard to reduce resignations. We have a Province in which there is no conflict

between the various Orders and I know that all the respective heads are aware that for them to prosper we need to have a strong Craft, as without that, they cannot succeed. I am also particularly proud of the relationship between the Craft and the Royal Arch. Wayne Williams has now retired after a successful and memorable term of office. The new Grand Superintendent, Jim Boughton did serve for four years as an Assistant Provincial Grand Master, so you will appreciate that there will remain a very strong association between the two principal orders.

I have more confidence in the future of Freemasonry than at any previous time and I am sure that we will all eniov a rewardina experience during the coming year. I look forward to being with you during my visits..

Update From Provincial Membership Officer



This issue's article is on the Members' Pathway - you may have heard about this through Freemasonry Today or on Social Media. So what is it and how is it being adopted across our Province?

The Members' Pathway came out of UGLE's Membership Focus Group and laid down an 11-step system to assist Lodges to plan, attract and retain their membership. It also includes a clear link to the Holy Royal Arch. It was formally launched towards the end of last season. So, what does it mean for our Province?

The 11-step system has been broken down into distinct sections with our intention being the establishment of best practice across these areas

Lodge Planning

Introducing a man into Freemasonry

Mentoring & Retention

Holy Royal Arch

Retrieval

As far as introducing a man into Freemasonry, a best practice document was produced more than a year ago after consulting with the Group Officers in each centre. The feedback is that this is proving very helpful for Lodaes.

The new style Information Eveninas were

successfully launched in January 2018 in Northampton and Towcester to provide a means for a gentleman to find out more about Freemasonry. There will be more planned for the forthcoming season so if your centre would like to host one then please aet in touch with me. The Provincial Grand Mentor, W.Bro Duncan Childs, will be communicating his strategy and best practice in due course. The establishment of best practice around the introduction of the Holy Royal Arch to new and existing Brethren is currently under discussion with the Provincial Grand Master and Grand Superintendent.

From The New Provincial Grand Almoner

Our region now has a dedicated team of people to support Almoners across the Province. The team consists of the Provincial Grand Almoner (PGA) and his assistants who co-ordinate all grant related activity as well as supporting the Lodge Almoners. There are a total of eight highly trained Provincial Local Support Officers who respond to referrals for help from Almoners and MCF.

Almoners are proactive in regular contact with Brethren, Widows and ex-Lodge Members.

The PGA believes that they need support to be even more responsive to the care and support needs of Masonic Families, For example, a recent meeting at Devonshire Court aims to kick start a program of improving understanding about the best way to guide people in accessing Respite and Care Facilities.

There is similar work going on with nonmasonic sources such as: Bereavement and Mental

2024 Festival Off to Good Start

As this Masonic season closes we can reflect on the progress of the 2024 MCF Festival and the part each of us has played so far.

The Festival is, of course, in support of the Masonic Charitable Foundation which does so much for Masonic families that fall upon hard times and also does much to improve the lives of the wider, non-Masonic community. This, our national Masonic charity, is one to which we all contribute and of which we can all be justifiably proud.

The Provincial Grand Master successfully launched the Festival in March. Many of you were able to attend one of the launch dinners at either Ellindon or Sheaf Close.

Back in our Lodges, many of us have been able to support motions to donate to the Festival Relief Chest. Consequently, progress towards our Festival target of £2.024m has so far been exceptionally good with donations and commitments from Lodges and individual Masons. Other Masonic orders within our

Province have also been generous with their support.

Donations to the Festival attract 2.25% annual interest, compound, which helps towards a Lodge's target.

A good way of enhancing Lodge fund raising, especially at well attended meetings, is through gift aided collections (eg with gift aid added, a collection of £240 becomes £300).



Support in Northamptonshire & Huntingdonshire

A gift aided collection can be for the benefit of your Lodge Relief Chest, the Provincial Grand Charity or the 2024 Festival directly.

By far the surest way a Lodge can meet its target is through as many members as possible being signed up to Regular Payment Promises. Each of us can fulfill that important part of our Masonic obligation by committing to pay whatever amount we can afford through this method. Again, gift aid adds a extra 25p in the pound to all donations.

Many members of the Province are already visibly demonstrating their support for the Festival by proudly wearing the Festival jewel at their Masonic and Chapter meetings. If you do not yet have your jewel, please see your Lodge Charity Steward.

In memory of the fallen

Last year W.Bro Duncan Jolly, Secretary of St Peter's Lodge No 442, received a communication via Province from Bro Arnold Wills of the Industrious Lodge 31 Canterbury. Arnold a Peterborian, Kings school (Scola Regia) pupil and chorister at the Cathedral wrote with regard to his Great Uncle, George Gaches and his Great cousin. Vernon Gaches, both being past members of St Peter's Lodge.

Investigation into the archives by W.Bro John Statham showed that George Gaches was initiated in 1863. when he was the Town Clerk. But it is his nephew, Arnold's Great cousin Vernon P Gaches who is of most interest.

Vernon, like Arnold, was an ex pupil of Scola Regia. Aged 26, he was home in Peterborouah for just three months on a visit

> from South Africa where he was living, and wished to join the fraternity before he returned to Blackfontien. Transvaal, where he was a mounted constable. Vernon was initiated on



Jan 11th 1906, traditionally an installation night at St Peter's. As a special concession a separate ceremony was organised and held before the installation was conducted.

Vernon was passed in February and raised in March 1906, all rather auick but not unknown back then. Vernon's Uncle, George Gaches



was present at all the ceremonies.


On the outbreak of WW1 Vernon joined an African Regiment and set sail for Europe as part of the huge Commonwealth forces joining Britain and France entrenched in war with Germany.

Vernon paid the ultimate sacrifice on Sept 21st 1917 at the battle of Passchendaele - 100 years ago to the month St Peter's received Arnold's enquiry.


Vernon's name is recorded in the Cathedral at St Sprite's Chapel as a past member of Scola Regia. At the request of Bro Arnold, and in respect of a fallen Bro of this lodge, with W.Bro Tony Esley's assistance the Lodge

Secretary laid a wreath in Vernon's memory in the Cathedral on the 100th anniversary of his death.

Acknowledgement must be made to W.Bro John Statham, for his time and efforts in helping find the records of George and Vernon, copies of which have been sent to Bro Arnold, and WBro Elsey for arranging with the British legion to provide the wreath.







Masons do go out in the day, you know...

Scout Lodge Always Does It's Duty

It was believed at one time that Baden Powell was a Freemason but this is not so.

Where this belief may have come about was that the aims and objectives of both scouts and masons are so similar.

In Scouting a scout promises 'To do my best, to do my duty to God and the Queen, to help other people, and to keep the Scout Law'.

The Masonic Principles are very similar, so it is hardly surprising that Scouters have become Masons and Masons have become Scouters - both have a kindred spirit. Also not surprising that they have joined together to form Masonic Lodges all over the country with a national

association called the Kindred Lodge Association. The Scout Lodge was started in this province in 2006 and now has close on forty members. The Mother Lodge of Scotland visits Dr Oliver

The last meeting of the season for Dr Oliver Lodge 3864 was a special one. The Worshipful Master Nick Cesare welcomed his close friend W.Bro Charles **Hughes and Right** W.Bro David Bloomfield, two guests from the Mother Killwinning Lodge 0 - The Mother Lodge of Freemasonry in Scotland.

Lodge Kilwinning was formed in the Ayeshire town of the same name, around the year 1140, coinciding with the building of Kilwinning Abbey. The Lodge's own written minutes begin in the year

1600. This is due to the fact that the original minutes were either lost in a fire at nearby Eglinton Castle, the home of the Montgomerie family who have always been associated with the Mother Lodge or lost at the Abbey at the time of the reformation.

The Grand Lodge in Edinburgh has the Old Schaw statutes from 1598 & 1599 and in these statutes they describe Kilwinning as the head lodge in Scotland. Prior to the formation of Grand Lodge, Mother Kilwinning was a Grand Lodge in her own right, issuing

charters to many other lodges. The Grand Lodge in Edinburgh was formed in the year 1736 and the Grand Lodge of Kilwinning continued to be represented until it was decided to number lodges according to seniority.

The Lodge did not receive its rightful place and withdrew from Grand Lodge and continued to issue charters as it had done so previously. This continued until the year 1807 when a meeting was held between the Grand Lodge of Kilwinning and the Grand Lodge of Scotland

and a new agreement was reached placing Kilwinning at the head of the roll of the Grand Lodge of Scotland.

With the signing of this agreement the Lodge gained certain privileges - the most important being that their RWM by right of that office became the PGM of Ayrshire, thus recognising the importance of Mother Kilwinning within the masonic world.

When it came to the Bicentenary of the formation of the UGLE in 1917, Lord Montgomerie, 16th Earl of Eglinton was invited to attend in London. At the time he was the Senior Grand Warden of the

Young Carers in Huntingdonshire given £30,000 grant

Children and young people in Huntingdonshire who are the primary carers for family members are benefitting from a £30,000 arant from this Province. The cheque was presented at St Ives Young Carers group in May.

The money will make all the difference to the young people that attend the groups. They rely on the groups for some time to be themselves, to talk, to know they will be listened to and to give them some breathing space. Carers Trust Cambridgeshire, Peterborough, Norfolk ensure it makes a difference to young carers by providing a wide range of activities for them including regular aroups, forums and trips away from home. As well as helping with their carina responsibilities. there is a focus on supporting educational. emotional, health and

wellbeing.

In the UK, there are an estimated 700,000 young carers. In 2016 Carers Trust Cambridaeshire. Peterborough, Norfolk supported almost 1,500 young carers and currently support 320 young carers in Huntingdonshire.

Young carers are at risk of falling behind at school due to their carina responsibilities. One in twenty miss school because of their carina role and 26 per cent of young carers have been bullied because they are a carer. Their carina responsibilities can affect their health including

mental health, social life and self-confidence.

Young Carers carry out a wide variety of tasks on a daily basis that are usually the responsibility of adults, for example, personal, emotional and practical support for their loved ones. Josie, 12, and Jamie, 10, of St Ives, are two young carers supported by Carers Trust Cambridgeshire, Peterborough, Norfolk. The young brother and sister help care for their siblings Amelie and Phoebe, who are triplets with Jamie and severely disabled. They help feed their sisters and assist their parents on family outings and with day-today tasks.

The grant has comes through the Masonic Charitable Foundation.

Miriam Martin, CEO for the Young Carers charity said: "I am overwhelmed. The money will mean that we can continue to provide Young Carers groups like this as they rely entirely on charitable donations. We are thrilled to receive such an outstanding grant from the Freemasons. Over the next three years it will enable us to young carers that are having a hard time, who need a break from their carina role to spend time with other young people in similar situations where they can feel safe and valued and be themselves."

Provincial Charity Steward Gerry Crawford, also said "We're very pleased to be able to help Carers Trust Cambridgeshire, Peterborough, Norfolk who support some of the most vulnerable people in our community. They really make a difference to those young people who give up so much of their childhood to care for their loved ones."

The cheque came at a areat time for the charity as it approached its annual free event, held for the first in Peterborough on 13th June. The event was an opportunity for carers, employers and supporters to come together, to have a chat, to take part in workshops, perhaps to learn something new and to recognise all family carers in the region for their outstanding work with Pride in Our Carers Awards. There were also awards for schools. employers and organisations that support carers in different wavs.

As well as being a celebration, the whole day raised awareness about the impact of caring and that there is support, advice and practical help available for those who need it and don't know where to find it

The roots of Piscator Lodge sprung from the City of London Piscatorial Society. which was a fishing club, or to put it more correctly 'a very respectable analina society'. Not only did they eniov their sport, they actively took part in analina competitions, some of which were international events

It was at one such event held in Dieppe in 1955 with 14 members of the society taking part, that a very important discovery was made. They were ALL Freemasons of other lodges. This called for some serious thought and they began discussing the formation of a fishing lodge but it was not



No.7557 iwas consecrated on the 29th January 1958.

When the lodge was formed it was made up of various brethren with one common interest.....Fishing, Some were even famous (in the world of fishing that is!) There were members such a Leslie Norman OBE, the chairman of the Sea Anglers association: Len Cacutt was the founding editor of the Analers Mail and went on to write and edit numerous angling publications; Eric Marshall Hardy who wrote 'Angling Ways' - first published in 1934, which I am sure many analers in the UK have copies of his books: Peter Tombleson who worked with Hardy's of Alnwick in developing rods and even had a B James (London) rod named after him. Sidney Seymour was a designer of angler's weights. And these are just the ones that I know about, but one thing I can say is that all the members of Piscator Lodge have been impacted by Angling in some shape or form.



You don't have to be a fisherman to be a member of Piscator Lodge, but it helps. Over the last 10 years a dozen or so members have regularly fished in Michigan USA for salmon and steelhead in the spring and autumn. The special Piscator Lodge question to all potential candidates is "are you a fisherman?" If the answer is not YES it does normally mean "Not yet". It's strange that fishing is always something inside us, like a small pilot light waiting to be lit and with our annual Michigan trip on offer; it's never too hard to get that flame re-ignited!

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'Old' Stamford **Prepares for a New** Season

Throughout the Masonic summer break, work has been going on by the Stamford Masonic Centre Committee to improve the building for the benefit of everyone concerned. One of the biggest projects to be undertaken in our recent history is the replacement of the original glazed units in the dining hall. The years had caused the windowpanes to grow brittle and presented a real danger that they might one day shatter and fall on members of the public using the car park below. Bespoke double glazed units have now been fitted. Because our Centre sits in the Stamford Conservation Area the window design had to meet strict standards. Whilst they maintain the aesthetic appeal of the old they also meet modern safety standards and will save on energy bills. The SMC Committee and Brethren are extremely grateful to the Province for assisting them with a loan from the Provincial Building Fund - all a far cry from the very first beginnings of Freemasonry in Stamford, If the Brethren of that time were beset with the practical issues of running a centre then

they never recorded it. This can only be because they never had any such concerns. Many Freemasons of this Province will have seen the replicated document that is mounted on the wall in Sheaf Close, Northampton, The original copy still hangs on the wall of St. Marys and All Saints Church, Fotheringhay and is dated 1435. At that time this was a collegiate church run by a monastic order. The church was then nationally important and today is noted for containing a mausoleum to leading members of the Yorkist dynasty. The ancient document is a charter from the Kinas Commissioners to extend the nave. It was granted to a local stonemason who signed the document, William Horwood, Master and Freemason of the Stamford Guild'. The old operative Guilds were closely associated with the Church establishment and it is possible that William's Guild met in the Corpus Christi Chapel of the town's 12th century church of St. Mary's. The excellent book 'The History of

Freemasonry in Stamford', by W.Bro R.J. Linnell, states the Lodge of Good Intent No. 87 (Ancients) first met in Stamford in 1803 at the Salutation Inn in the Beast Market. This is what we

now know as Broad Street. The Salutation Inn sat on the corner of Broad Street and Newgates and is today the home of an NHS Dental practice. This Lodge was erased in 1827. When the 1840 warrant of the Lodge of Merit arrived in Stamford in 1865 it made its home in The George Hotel. In 1925 it moved to The Stamford Hotel and Assembly Rooms where it stayed until 1972 when it temporarily moved to the old school rooms in Austin Street. The Bluecoat School went up for sale in 1975. It was purchased by members of the Lodge of Merit and converted into what we see today.

So, the Stamford Masonic Centre, owned and run by local Freemasons, can be considered a relatively recent innovation, its ancient operative counterpart having met in a local church and the later speculative Lodges having predominantly met in the towns Inns and Hotels These earlier homes of Freemasonry in the town were very different from the Stamford Masonic Centre. Its just possible those early Lodges would envy what is now our permanent home, despite the need to run it.

Now that all three of our planned Testing sessions have been completed at Northampton, Peterborough and Corby, we can now look back and consider the success of the initiative, how it came about and perhaps more crucially, where do we ao from here?

Even though the Province of Dorset was the first to launch the initiative in 2014, it was in the early part of 2016 that we began to take note of promotional material and Social Media postings from a growing number of Provinces who, by then, had already launched their own individual arrangements with 1300 Brethren passing through PSA testing sessions.

My own time as Grand Superintendent was drawing to a close and ever conscious of the vast sums we are proud to distribute to so many worthy causes each year through the MCF and individual Provinces, it occurred to me that sometimes, just sometimes, we should also be thinking of the well-being and health of all those Brethren/Companions who make such generosity possible.

With one in seven men said to be contracting Prostate Cancer - the most prevalent cancer in men with well over 40,000 diagnoses a year - and now said to have overtaken female breast cancers as a primary cause of death, it was time to take action. With monies accruing year by year on the Royal Arch Provincial Charity accounts, it was then that the Royal Arch Provincial Executive took the decision under the Royal Arch banner to join those other Craft Provinces involved in the PSA Testina initiative.

The Graham Fulford Charitable Trust now follow up with all participants who have fallen into this category to ensure that appropriate action was being taken. We know not who they are - results are confidential to the participant - but we have been grateful for all the complimentary comments and feedback we have received for introducina such an initiative and which has ensured that at least 22 of our Companions/Brethren are now receiving treatment for a deadly threat which they simply didn't know they had.

But where do we go from here? Ideally, a follow-up test in 24 months might seem appropriate – but who funds it? We have greatly reduced our Provincial Charitable Fund to achieve the success we have so far and we have been grateful for the voluntary

donations we received on the morning of testing by so many participants. But does the individual look to cover the cost of any further tests, do Chapters take this initiative on board for future, modest contributions or do we seek support, in whole or in part, from the Craft and the Provincial Grand Charity at a time when we are all heavily engaged in Festival 2024. Options will no doubt be discussed in some detail by the Royal Arch Provincial Executive with all participating parties in due course but, for the time being, we can be well pleased with the initiative we have taken and for the results which have come to light.

Just ask those 22 men whose future might now be so much brighter. They will agree and thank you all for the support you have given with so much enthusiasm to such an important and well received project.
