Message From The Provincial Grand Master

Brethren,

As I write this piece for Password, its early August and we are preparing to start another new and exciting Masonic season. During the summer break we have held two extremely well received Membership Roadshows, introducing the Members' Pathway and our Membership Challenge to attract, engage and retain. There is more on how all Brethren can help on pages 18 - 21.

Why is this Challenge so important? In recent years many of our Lodges have reduced the number of times they meet, some to as low as four times a year. Meeting so infrequently, it is difficult for such Lodges to grow. A Lodge meeting four times a year and wishing to complete an initiation, passing, raising and Installation, during the year, can only grow by one member a year. Then only if it has zero deaths and zero resignations, which is unlikely. One death and one resignation and the Lodge is in decline.

A Lodge that meets eight times a year, with a full workload of single ceremonies can only move forward in numbers if it only loses a member a year. With a membership where over 25% are over 80 years old, we must be realistic. We need to grow considerably

and by more than just one or two new members per year, per Lodge. The question is how? The answer quite simply we must embrace multiple ceremonies, initiate multiple applicants as soon as practically possible (if unknown to us, yes after getting to know them) we cannot expect a gentleman in 2023 to wait 18 months or more to join, he just won't, his life will be filled with other activities available today.

I often hear the view that the initiation and raising ceremonies are very special and should be singular, however I have also heard from those initiated with another one or two individuals, how good it was to be in a group and how special that relationship is with those who shared it with them. I hear "we don't do it like that in our lodge," I would then ask you, how do



you think your predecessors built their lodges to 60,70, or even 80 members in the years long before we all joined? They held multiple ceremonies. Loften now listen to the minutes read out in meetings of one hundred years ago, and frequently hear that Lodges were not only initiating multiple numbers on the night, but even holding a second ceremony on the same evening to pass or raise brethren. I have recently witnessed a raising ceremony for FIVE brethren, which was superbly carried out and entertaining to watch. I am

convinced, along with our Pro Grand Master, that multiple ceremonies are the route to real growth in numbers, and I encourage everyone to discuss this in your committee meetings and thereby ensure your lodge can grow and thrive.

Attracting sufficient numbers of interested gentlemen is of course also required and I am delighted to have seen the number of Lodges and Groups that have been working together over the summer on information days, events, open days etc. The more we engage with the public and show what a cause for good Freemasonry is in our community, the more positive engagement we will receive.

Engagement and Retention we know are critical and we must ensure we work together to make our shared Masonic journey enjoyable and fun, as well as challenging enough that we grow as individuals. We must ensure every member is involved in some way, either during our ceremonies, festive boards or in our fundraising or social events outside of the Lodge room. Ensuring we are all actively engaged and that it is enjoyable, leads us to build lifelong friendships. Share the work more across the Past Masters, for example the Traditional History, usually delivered by one senior Past Master, can be split into five distinct pieces. We have particular Officers in every Lodge: Almoner; Mentor etc, but it is incumbent on every one of us to engage with our fellow members and support and assist them not just in their ritual but in every aspect and to contact them outside of the Lodge by staying in touch with each other throughout the year and offering assistance and

support where and when needed.

I firmly believe that the Royal Arch has a lot to offer and is a key part of engagement during our individual Masonic journeys as do many of the other companion orders. With a sound Craft and Royal Arch foundation there is something for everyone across our wider Masonic family.

We have started this new journey to address our Membership Challenge with great vigour and enthusiasm, I thank you all and assure you of the support from the Province, especially our Provincial Membership Team and my executive, as we work together to continue to build our very special, thriving and vibrant Province.

He was always keen to further Freemasonry, as an excellent ritualist, and mentor to many who joined. On his evening of 50 years in Freemasonry following the presentation of his certificate he took the chair and closed the lodge in fine fashion.

RW.Bro Michael Henry Roalfe passed to the Grand Lodge Above on 21st August 2023, aged 88. He was born and educated in Norfolk before moving to Leicester in 1958 to join a Quantity Surveying practice, he was also a Justice of the

Despite the suspension of our activities with the unwelcome intervention of Covid, we are meeting that challenge. Many Lodges have already reached their taraet and more are close to doing so. Progress can be monitored on the Provincial website. The final total will be announced at Provincial Grand Lodge on Thursday 16 May 2024.

It is now time to go that extra mile and act before the Festival concludes on 31 March 2024. We need to make sure, both

personally and as Lodges, we are doing all we can to not only reach our target but to exceed it by as much as possible. The cause is well worth that extra effort. On our behalf, the MCF is doing sterling work for both the Masonic family and non-Masonic charities. It also funds hospices, medical research and disaster relief.

You may not be aware that a registered charity that supports disadvantaged children and young people or is working to reduce loneliness and isolation in later life can make direct application to the MCF for a grant. (This is particularly relevant when the grant being sought is outside the scope of the Provincial Grand Charity.)

An example of a local charity that has successfully made such an application is the Northampton based Thomas's Fund which

provides life-changing music therapy for children and young

and young people from across
Northampto nshire who have a life-limiting illness or disability.
The grant, of £15,000,



will enable the charity to employ qualified music therapists who visit the children and young people at home or in hospital, enabling them to take part in music sessions, however limited their movement. This is particularly important for children who are too ill or disabled to attend school.



ensure that all

PSA Testing in this Province

In the latest round of PSA testing events put on by the Provincial Grand Chapter earlier this year, 431 tests were carried out across the three events, with the results broken down as follows:

Northampton: 141 Tests of which 137 were Green, 0 Amber and 4 Red. According to the Graham Fulford trust the 4 in Northampton were "Very Red"

Peterborough: 149 Tests of which 141 were Green, 5 Amber and 3 Red.

Corby: 141 Tests of which 137 were Green, 2 Amber and 2 Red. Whilst it is very encouraging that the majority of those tested had a Green results letter,

it is hoped that those who received Amber or Red result letters are able to follow up with their own medical professionals quickly and effectively. For new PSA testing dates, see page 35.
