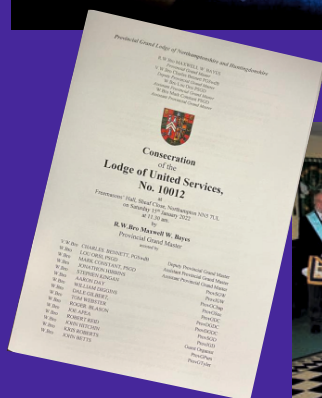

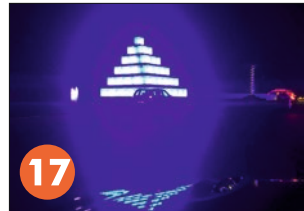

Message From The Provincial Grand Master

Brethren,

I hope that everyone enjoyed a happy festive season despite the obvious concerns and restrictions. We have moved into a new year with renewed hope and positivity. Let us pray that through being careful and cautious, we can continue to meet and enjoy our Freemasonry.

We have a very exciting period ahead of us with many special events approaching. The first will be on 15th January when many of us will congregate at Sheaf Close to carry out the consecration of a new Lodge. This will be The Lodge Of United Services number 10012 and is yet another 'special interest' Lodge for our Province. This is designed to accommodate not only members past and present of the armed

services, but also anyone whose job entails the wearing of a uniform. There are a large number of founders and the first Master will be W Bro Luigi Orsi, Assistant Provincial Grand Master. I am sure that this will prove to be a vibrant and successful Lodge. There are already candidates awaiting initiation.

In the not too distant future we will be consecrating yet another 'special interest' Lodge as approval has now been received from Grand Lodge for the formation of Mulliner Classic Car Lodge No 10019. This is designed to accommodate those brethren interested in classic motor cars, and again, there are numerous founders.

These items are just part of what I envisage as interesting times ahead for Freemasonry in general and our Province in particular. Despite the pandemic, we have continued to progress well with the 2024 Festival and I thank all who have made such great efforts. We are on



target for a marvellous result. The Province has already adopted the Pathway and other initiatives emanating from Grand Lodge and I believe that these are showing positive results. VW Charles Bennett, Deputy Provincial Grand Master, now heads the retention team that deals with resignations from Lodges. This team is also producing some impressive results.

In fact, the membership numbers within the Province show an interesting progression. You will all remember that prior to Covid we were very gradually increasing our membership numbers. That trend was impossible to maintain once our Lodges stopped meeting. However, there are some interesting statistics to be drawn over the past eighteen months. The



number of deaths in the Province were very similar to any normal period as, also, were the number of resignations. Overall, because we did not carry out any initiations, our number inevitably fell and the worst situation on a year on year basis was a deficit of 180. The current position is a deficit of 120 so we are rapidly retrieving the situation. As a Province we are currently introducing an amazing number of initiates and I expect this trend to continue. I know that our members are actively seeking new members and we are also benefitting from the Marketing Campaign launched by Grand Lodge last September. Dealing with men approaching us through the websites as opposed to the traditional method of a member introducing a friend, causes its own difficulties, but we have introduced methods of interviewing

and vetting these people, and we are finding some excellent results. I believe that a man who has taken the trouble to research our organisation and then make an unsolicited approach, is often more suitable than someone who is, perhaps, coerced by a friend. I also am convinced that the success of our Light Blues club – the New & Young Masons Club -will have a significant effect on the



reduction of our resignations. I would suggest that the formation of this Club is perhaps the most important innovation for many years.

Brethren, we live in unusual times and none can be sure of the future. However, our Province is in good heart and I am sure that we are all enjoying being together again. Let us be positive and plan our future with confidence. I wish you all the very best and look forward to meeting with you all during the coming months.

The Provincial Grand Master has also been pleased to confirm the following changes with regard to operations at Provincial Headquarters.

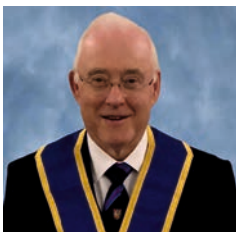
W.Bro Gilbert Williamson

An Introduction to Hermes

Those of us who have gazed over at the Secretary's or Scribe E's table when we are in the Lodge Room may wonder at how the occupant of that office weaves his mystical magic to ensure that our meetings are properly prepared and run as smoothly as they do. Until relatively recently, the clue has been the jewel of his office – two quill pens in saltire. The quill pen was not only their badge of office, it was their working tool. Well, the pen and a piece of paper, at least.

Then along came ADelphi and ADelphi II. In the latter part of the 20th Century,

Freemasons in this country took a major leap forward and introduced – yes – a computer system to manage membership data. Technology has moved forward significantly since ADelphi II was introduced.

Enter Hermes. Hermes, in Greek mythology is an Olympian deity. The herald of the Gods. He is able to move quickly and freely between the worlds of the mortal and the divine, aided by his winged sandals. Think of your Secretary/Scribe E. Can you now see why the name Hermes was selected for our new administration system?

How does Hermes Work?

Hermes is a Web application specifically designed for all Lodges and Chapters under the jurisdiction of UGLE and SGC. It will enable Secretaries and Scribes E to manage their processes electronically and eliminate the need for most paper-based forms. **Figure A** below shows the relationship between the ADelphi and Hermes systems and the UGLE/SGC database.

What will Hermes do to help Secretaries/Scribes E?

Many functions will be managed through Hermes:

Membership: Basic personal and contact data, membership status; data extracts for mailing/emailing; submission of Installation Returns.

Journey: Tracking an individual from "contact" through candidate to membership; clearance certificates; an electronic Form P; Grand Lodge/Grand Chapter Certificates requests.

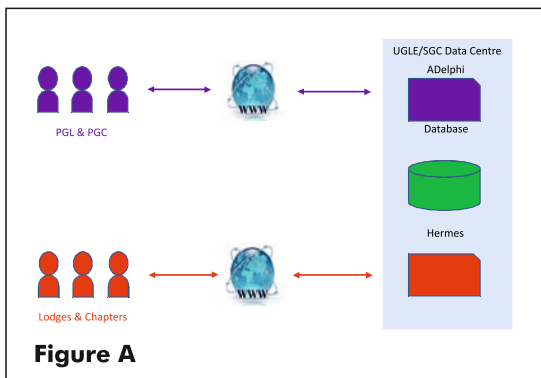

Financial Functions:

Annual returns; all UGLE/SGC charges will in future be billed on Annual Returns, including registrations fees and dispensations; payments both electronic and by cheque.

Data Analytics:

Attendances, resignations, recapture, participation in ceremonies.

Additional Functions:

Generation of wording for summons to comply with the Book of Constitutions; post meeting reports; generation of dispensation requests.

Hermes comes equipped with an extensive "Help Hub" which is designed to help users complete the work they need to.

There is likewise a "Support System" to escalate any issues Secretaries and Scribes E have been unable to resolve themselves. There are also a number of training webinars recorded so for viewing at users' leisure.

Implementation

Our Craft and Royal Arch Provinces have been designated for implementation of Hermes during February and March. The month of February will be taken up with the Provincial Steering Group being trained and becoming familiar with Hermes. The date for full implementation across all Craft Lodges and Chapters is 1st April 2022.

A Craft and Royal Arch Steering Group, headed by W.Bro Mark Constant, APGM has been working towards the release of Hermes. Other members of the Steering Group are: W.Bro William Diggins, ProvGSec, W.Bro John Fergusson, PMO, W.Bro Simon Key, ProvGReg, W.Bro Malcolm Saxby, PPGSuptWks, E.Comp Derek Pearson, 3rdProvGPrin E.Comp Mike Binsted, ProvGSE.

We are here to ensure that the Hermes roll-out is successful and seamless. Information in the form of short information videos and documents are already being used to help users work towards full implementation.

W.Bro Mark Constant added "I never cease to be impressed with the commitment and diligence of our Craft Secretaries and Royal Arch Scribes E. Hermes presents us with the opportunity to help them deliver their key roles by eliminating unnecessary paperwork and processes by taking advantage of what the latest technology has to offer Freemasonry and our membership. I am sure all of us are looking forward to the real benefits it will bring in streamlining the administration of our units."

Have You Got Any Candidates For Us?

This question is put to me by members of Lodges who are keen to initiate gentlemen who have come through the UGLE website into their Lodges.

For this important task, I use our Group Membership Officers to screen enquiries and, if gentlemen are suitable, direct them to the most appropriate Lodge. It will depend on which Lodge is best suited to the candidate who remains at the centre of the process. For example, important considerations are often the day(s) of the week that the gentlemen is available as well as the most best location. However, it's important to remember that these unsponsored candidates should supplement a Lodge's own candidate attraction work through its own members.

There are at least two initiates from the National Digital Marketing Campaign who were

known to several members of the Lodges which they have joined. Furthermore, evidence still suggests that 90% of members join through personal contacts.

So, how can you start to attract gentlemen into your Lodge?

Tell Your Story: If you are comfortable then talking with friends, neighbours, and colleagues then I frequently say that we are the best advocates for our wonderful fraternity. Particularly, when we talk about what we love about it and why we joined. A positive and enthusiastic ambassador is worth his weight in gold.

No Hard Sell: There's no need for a hard sell, in fact, it should be discouraged. We want gentlemen to join because they want to not because they feel that they have to join. So, casual references to Lodge or Ladies Nights



in conversation or copies of Freemasonry Today on your coffee table may well provide cues for conversation. The positive profile through the excellent work from UGLE makes this all the easier.

Let's continue to work on building Freemasonry for the 21st century and for a new generation of Freemasons!

After an extremely busy couple of years dealing with the pandemic and associated distress,

I can report that we have seen a reduction in the number of applicants for formal support from the Masonic Charitable Foundation (MCF). We have also seen a drop in numbers of emergency grants issues from the Provincial Grand Charity.

In this financial year we have awarded grants totalling £182,000 to 86 applicants. This compares to £249,000 to 110 applicants in the same period last year.

I ask you all to remain vigilant as we resume

our regular meetings, there may well Brethren and families who have suffered during the pandemic, but who may not have asked for help.

Our Provincial Grand Almoner team (PGA) cascade system is working well, with Almoners having a designated Local Support Officer who can help and advise before escalating to the Provincial Grand Almoner or one his Assistants. The referral system is working well and MCF has reduced its response time for all applications, most being decided and settled within 6 weeks.

The Broken Column initiative has received some good response. So far we have

distributed over 100 brooches and booklets with a further 50 ready for immediate distribution.



Just a reminder that these brooches are for Masonic widows/partners of deceased Masons. The brooch and booklet cost just £6 and are available from myself or member of the PGA team.

Since the last edition of Password, we have made good progress with the implementation of the Members' Pathway project,

revised our Mentor support material and created a new team to assist Lodge Mentors.

The Mentors' Handbook has been updated and distributed to Lodges. The Handbook now includes reference to the updated Peterborough Booklets, the Members' Pathway and the new recommended Lodge Mentoring policy. The Lodge Mentor therefore has the latest material available to him and a simplified documentary approach to Mentoring to help him in his work. The Handbook and updated Peterborough Booklets will cover most of the information and guidance a newer Brother will need, to help him make the most of his Masonry and fully enjoy membership of our order.

The Province has appointed senior Brethren to a new

role of Provincial Mentor Liaison Officer (MLO) in each of the following Masonic Centres:

W.Bro Alex Thomson (Northampton)
W.Bro Dale Gilbert (Wellingborough and Rushden)
W.Bro Alex Henderson (Corby)
W.Bro John Pilbeam (Huntingdon)
W.Bro Stuart Morgan (Stamford)
W.Bro Tony Elsey (Peterborough)
W.Bro Rick Hill (South West) and
W.Bro Duncan Childs (Kettering and Thrapston)

The new MLO team will work closely with me and liaise with Lodge Mentors in each Centre to support them in their work.

To cover the Members' Pathway and the new Handbook, the MLO team will meet Lodge Mentors in each Centre early in 2022. We also hope further MLO meetings are held in each Centre every six months or so. Such meetings provide a great way of exchanging ideas. They also provide feedback and suggestions for improvements

in Lodge Mentoring both for the Provincial Grand Mentor and the Provincial Members' Pathway Working Party.

Feedback following introduction of the updated Peterborough Booklets has been positive, but we are always open to suggested improvements for the 2023 edition.

Hard copies of the Peterborough booklet have been distributed to Lodge Secretaries and Lodge Mentors will also receive a stock.

Electronic copies will be distributed by MLOs and are available via the Provincial website. We therefore hope all Masons in Province will have access to the Booklets to help with their daily advancement and support full engagement with their Lodges over the coming weeks.

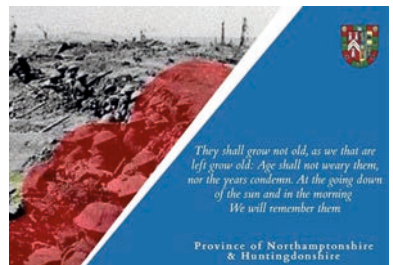

A year ago in Password I started by saying, "What a year! A year like no other." Well, we have now had a second year "like no other." However, in the latter part of last year, we were finally able to resume business (almost) as usual.

A positive from the experience has been the magnificent response of Freemasonry, showing it is truly a force for good in the community. Not only have we supported Masonic families in need during the crisis but we have also

supported the wider community.

Last year the MCF, our national Masonic charity, supported in this Province 88 vulnerable Freemasons and their families with grants of over £300,000, together with 24 charities with grants of over £170,000, many of which were in need as a result of Covid-19.

Nationally, Freemasonry gave an incredible £51m in charitable support and funding to communities - £20.5m awarded through



6,571 MCF grants with over £4.7m of the MCF's funding provided to individuals and communities struggling through the impact of COVID-19.

All this was made possible through the generosity of Freemasons in supporting the MCF (in this Province mainly through the 2024 Festival) and our own Provincial Grand Charity. In the circumstances this generosity has held up remarkably well, given that, for much of 2021, no face-to-face fundraising was possible.

We are making good progress towards our Festival target and, if we all play our part, should be able to exceed it. Thank you for all your charitable contributions to date. They are very much appreciated, not least by the recipients of this Masonic charitable support.

Don't forget to ask your Lodge Charity Steward to for a Festival jewel. You can then proudly wear it at Lodge meetings. This will show you are an active supporter of the Festival. It is not to flaunt your largesse but simply to demonstrate your

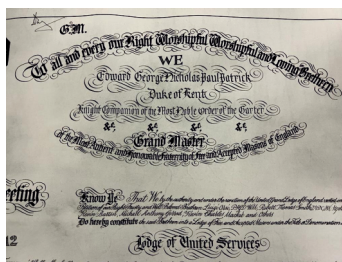
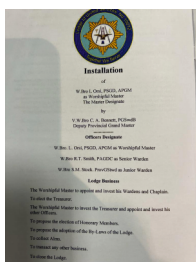


At the end of the meeting, Bro Tony Reeves made a presentation to the Worshipful Master, of three gavels he had handcrafted for use in the lodge in the

We were saddened to announce the passing of Past Assistant Provincial Grand Master VW.Bro Wayne Edward Williams PGSwdB to the Grand Lodge Above on the evening of Friday the 1st of October 2021.

VW.Bro Wayne died from injuries received during an accident at his home a few weeks prior. He was 79-years of age.

Wayne was a much loved and respected member of our Masonic community. He was a Brother and Companion with real charisma, compassion, and humour.

Wayne joined Freemasonry when he was initiated into Lodge of Harmony No. 9048 in 1984. He

subsequently became a member of the Royal Arch in 1988 when he was exalted into Northampton Chapter 360.

Wayne received his first Provincial promotion in Craft when he was made Past Provincial Grand Steward in 1994. He was subsequently appointed as Provincial Junior Grand Warden in 1998 and Provincial Grand Secretary in 2000.

Wayne served as PGSec until his appointment as Assistant Provincial Grand Master

in 2005, an office he held for 7-years.

Wayne was a Founder of two Craft Lodges: Sulgrave Lodge No. 9462 and Webb Ellis Lodge No. 9740. Furthermore, he was an honorary member of seven lodges.



Wayne received his first Grand Rank appointment in 2001 when he was made active Assistant Grand Director of Ceremonies. He then became Past Senior Grand Deacon in 2006, Past Deputy Grand Sword Bearer in 2008, and Past Grand Sword Bearer in 2012.

In the Royal Arch, Excellent Companion Wayne received his first Provincial appointment in 2002 when he was made Past Provincial Grand Sword Bearer.

Then, in 2007, he was appointed as Most Excellent Grand Superintendent, an office he would hold

for 11 years, building the membership and enthusiasm of this beautiful Order. He was an honorary member of no fewer than eleven Royal Arch chapters in the Province.

We will greatly miss Wayne's sharp wit, repartee, and warmth at our gatherings.

A banker by profession, he bought his wider professional and people skills to our Province. He was a great rugby fan being a supporter of



Northampton Saints, and of course, Wales.

Our thought and prayers are with his wife, Jean, and the rest of his family at this trying time.

May he rest in peace.

A Daily Advancement

The Richard Sandbach Lodge of Research No. 9600 would like to offer this article to those keen on pursuing their 'daily advancement' of Masonic knowledge. Look out for further articles in future editions of Password.

The Three Great Lights

*'The three Great Lights will guide our steps
Through life's uncertain way,
And bring us safe at length to see
The bright eternal day.'*

The three '**Great Lights**' are the **Square**, the **Compasses** and the **Volume of the Sacred Law**.

The Square represents, and is synonymous with, good conduct. Within it the whole Craft is ordered. The Compasses express the bounds of our daily lives, the full circle of our actions. The Volume of the Sacred Law, being considered the word of God, is a clear source of inspiration and instruction as to how we should try to order our own existence.

As an early example of

moral instruction, 4000 years ago in China was written: 'a man should abstain from doing unto others what he would not they should do to him; and this is called the principle of acting on the **square**.'

Mencius (270 BC) taught that 'men should apply the **square** and **compasses** morally to their lives, 'A **Master Mason**, in teaching apprentices, makes use of the **compasses** and the **square**. Ye who are engaged in the pursuit of wisdom must also make use of the **compass** and

square'

All this we teach our new Entered Apprentice, but consider the significance of the relative positions of the '**Great Lights**' when we first see them. The **Compasses** lie within the confines of the **Square** and are dominated by it. Both rest resolutely on an open page of the **Volume of the Sacred Law**.

It serves to show us that the concept of brotherhood is not something that we put on for our meetings and then put aside

until the next one, but be carried with us into our daily lives and our relationships with others.

The 'light' that Freemasonry holds up for us is not designed to just illuminate itself, but to help shed light on all the world.

In the Closing Ceremony we hear:
'...and may He continue to preserve our order by beautifying and adorning us with every moral and social virtue.'

The reputation of Freemasonry, the power to be a force for good in the world, even its very existence is in the hands of every Freemason. If we are to be open about our membership, we must also accept the responsibility to be its

ambassadors. It is easier to only own to being a Mason among other Masons. But what message does that give? That we are ashamed of what we profess to admire??

If we truly believe that Freemasonry has any worth in the world, we must also believe that we are of worth to Freemasonry. The ritual makes it clear that the survival of the Order is inextricably linked with the behaviour of every Mason. It is by our demonstration of 'every moral and

social virtue' that the Craft will be preserved, These **'Great Lights'** and the lessons they teach are surely enough to see us safely through to that 'bright eternal day.

performed the raising of Bro Johnson Lee.

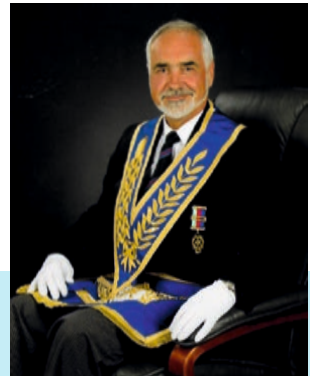

PSA Testing for possible signs of Prostate Cancer

November 2021 saw the start of the 2021/22 season of PSA testing at



Northampton with 228 Companions and Brethren from the West of the Province attending. The second screening

year's programme and will be held at Corby on 2nd April 2022, for all Companions and Brethren in the centre of the Province together with anyone who was unable to attend the previous



two sessions. Information regarding the event at Corby will shortly be sent to all Companions and Brethren in the Corby, Kettering, Thrapston, Wellingborough and Rushden areas.
