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Introducing Hermes

UGLE have created a new software package to assist our Lodge Secretaries. Called Hermes, it will enable Secretaries to perform the majority of what is presently paper based tasks online, directly updating the currently used Adelphi database. Hermes will assist and guide Secretaries through their administration tasks to ensure all records and requests are in order.

The roll out programme will be supported by one team with two specialist 'champions', one for the Craft and one for the HRA, to assist with those areas of difference in terminology or approach. 

Message From The Provincial Grand Master

Brethren,

Most of us will be receiving the vaccine during coming weeks which will provide us with safety from this terrible pandemic which has damaged so many lives. As I write this, it is not possible to predict as to how soon we may begin to enjoy our Freemasonry in a manner to which we were all accustomed. However. when full activity resumes. perhaps we will appreciate much more what we have and what an amazina organisation it is to which we belong.

I congratulate all of those members who have worked so hard to keep us connected over the past 10



months. We have enjoyed some really exciting innovations such as University Challenge style, Question of Sport, Music Quizzes and many other events, all being enjoyed via electronic means. A year ago, very few of us had heard of Zoom, but now we all accept it as our means of meeting together. I am aware that many Lodges have arranged Zoom meetings, often on evenings when the Lodge would normally have met, and that has also helped enormously. Despite these modern methods of communication, we have not forgotten those elder brethren who may not embrace the technology. They have been cared for with regular telephone calls and visits where possible.

I am firmly of the opinion that one of the most important happenings in our Province in recent times has been the formation of the New & Young Masons Club. I congratulate the young men who have made this such a success. not forgetting those established members who have been available to offer support and advice to the newer members. The activities of this club during these very trying times has



helped enormously.

Another organisation that has been carrying out vital work is our 3 Pillars Feeding The Homeless Trust, Not only is this Trust providing comfort and support to many extremely distressed people, but it is constantly presenting to the public a face of Freemasonry of which they were previously unaware. Other Provinces around the country are seeking advice and guidance with ideas of trying to set up similar operations and our work is well known and appreciated by the powers that be in Great Queen Street, The Masonic Charitable Foundation have been making a lot of money available to help charities throughout the country, and I am delighted that we have secured funds of almost £33,000 for the purchase another vehicle. This will enable the Trust to extend its crucial operations into other parts of our Province.

The work that is carried out does involve substantial funding as we not only provide food, but also clothing, bedding and personal hygiene goods to our clients. I would ask that, even in these difficult times, Lodges and individuals continue to support the Trust as has happened in the past. The original van that operates in Peterborough is pictured below.



You will know that over recent years we have been achieving a steady increase in our membership numbers. This steady progress has now been devastated by the pandemic. We have unfortunately, but inevitably, lost some

members through death, and there have been some unavoidable resignations. During this time we have. of course, not carried out any initiations. The result is that the statistics tell me that we are now around eighty less in number than we were at this time last year. I appreciate the difficulties that some members are experiencing. Many will have been affected by being furloughed and some will have suffered redundancy. It is now the time of year when many Lodge Subscriptions become due and I am sure that some are considering whether they should continue to pay for something in which they are not able to participate. Brethren, before long we will be meeting again and let us remember that Lodge expenses still accrue even when the country is in lockdown. The positive anale to our numbers concerns is that there are in excess of eightv gentlemen who would have been initiated by now had we been able to meet. It

may be that it is not safe for us to meet normally for several months yet, so I repeat what I have already announced. Lodges that wish to meet during the summer months may be able to do so. Not only will this give Lodges an opportunity to 'catch up' with outstanding ceremonies, but it will enable all of us to enjoy our Freemasonry 'live' once again.

Brethren, stay positive, keep connected and be cheerful. We will all meet together in peace, love and harmony.

Have faith brethren, and always remember – This too will end.

Once on the introductory facing page, you can set up a user name and password to access all the various modules available, this page has a section 'Getting Started'.

For those who have not yet registered, there is also a 'webinar', which informs brethren how it all works and how to access all the facilities. This is available by clicking on Solomon System - Information for Users which is near the bottom of the home page on the right hand side (see below).



Although there is an enormous amount of information on the platform, it can be quite easily navigated to find specific information, or just to let yourself be drawn down the 'rabbit hole' of curiosity! Please use and enjoy this resource to the full and encourage other masons to do so.

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Little did I know what lay ahead of me when I took over as Provincial Almoner in February 2020. Within weeks we went into lockdown and my personal learning curve accelerated beyond belief. It is all too easy to focus on the negatives in these difficult times and sadly we have lost a number of our Brothers over the last few months.

Thinking positively, I have no doubt that the cessation of Masonic gatherings really did protect us from the coronavirus pandemic, and, whilst we have lost Brethren, the feeling I have is that the active Masonic community has been brought closer together. I certainly feel more connected with the Almoners and the Provincial Almoner (PGA) team than might have been the case in 'normal' times and many Lodges and associated groups have held regular virtual meetings to help keep everyone in touch.

The Brother to Brother scheme has worked well and been adopted wholeheartedly by some Lodges, whereas others have found differing ways to keep in touch with their Brethren. We all know of Brothers who pay their dues, but who live miles away,

sometimes even overseas. My Lodge saw these Brothers appearing on Zoom calls and reacquainting themselves with old friends and it proved very uplifting for us all.

In September 2020, the PGA Team launched a virtual conference and followed it up with eight consecutive weeks of Zoom meetings for Almoners and Senior Group Officers.

After a slow start we ended up with an overall turnout of over 70% of the potential attendees; a big improvement on the attendance for meetings in the past.

Continuing with the good news, we launched a regular Health Welfare and Wellbeing feature and in December I was very pleased to announce the launch of 'Brother Line' a freephone helpline for this Province tackling loneliness and isolation in the Masonic community. I won't further expand here, as this edition of Password features more detail on these two initiatives.

Finally, I just wanted to give you an idea of how much work goes on behind the scenes supporting Masonic Welfare. In this financial year to date the Masonic Charitable Foundation has given £212,000 of assistance to 105 cases in this Province, compared to £140,000 and 79 cases in the same period last year. This is an increase of over 50% in monetary assistance and a 33% increase in cases. The PGA Team manages most of these cases, even if they are self-referrals, and I am grateful to the Almoners, Local Support Officers and Visiting Volunteers for their continued support and dedication.

Let us all hope that 2021 sees a resumption of our regular Masonic meetings, but please be reassured that the we are here for you and working harder than ever to keep up with the welfare demands of our community. Happy New Year to you all.

What a year! A year like no other. 2020 has taken us on a journey of isolation and restriction. Within Freemasonry we have missed our face-toface interaction with fellow Masons. Many of our traditional methods of fund raising have had to be suspended. We have had no alms collections during meetings. We have missed aift aided collections and raffles at Festive Boards. We have not been able to have our usual fund raising events such as garden parties, barbeques or Ladies' Festivals. Our fitter members have not been able fund raise by walking, running, climbing, jumping and the like. Our fund raising capability has therefore been severely diminished. This against a background of greatly increased demand from our members due to the effects of the pandemic on them and their

families. Similarly, non-Masonic charities, large and small, have not been able to fund raise in their usual ways but have been inundated with requests for help in alleviating the effects to the pandemic. Whilst these are difficult times, they give Freemasonry an ideal opportunity to demonstrate its place in, and support of, the general community of which it is a part. Our Masonic charities have responded magnificently to this challenge. Nationally, the Masonic Charitable Foundation has helped 4,036 Masonic families in distress with grants totalling £13.2m. Locally, the Provincial Grand Charity has awarded a total of £25.257 to 36 Masonic families in distress. In addition, the Masonic Charitable Foundation has made grants to 399 non-Masonic charities

totalling £4.5m, helping them to combat the effects of coronavirus. The **Provincial Grand Charity** has supported 34 non-Masonic local charities with grants totalling £59,306. This Masonic generosity of spirit has rightly received positive national and local media coverage, improving the image of Freemasonry in the public perception. In the run up to Christmas, Devonshire Court appealed for help in making the festive period more enjoyable for the residents. This Province responded generously with donations of festive food and drink, as well as cash donations. Our year of restricted activity has seen innovation in the ways we can fund raise. Gift aided donations can now be made to Lodge Relief Chests digitally, using





smartphones or computers in association with the relevant QR code or internet link. Paperless transfers can also be made from Lodge Relief Chests to the Festival. Lodge Charity Stewards have details of how to do this.

It should be stressed that these digital age innovations do not replace existing methods. They simply add to them in an effort to make processes simpler and more streamlined.



Thank you to those who used the

link to log on to Amazon to buy their Christmas presents, gaining the Provincial Grand Charity a donation from Amazon in the process. £264.88 had been received before the festive period. I look forward to seeing the next set of figures.

To give the finances of the Provincial Grand Charity a further boost, the

Provincial Grand
Master's Bonus Ball is
being launched. This will

run on the Provincial website and be based on Saturday night's National Lottery Bonus Ball winner. Sheets with numbers from one to 59 will be published on the Provincial website. The numbers can be purchased by players for £10 each with online payment once they are logged in as registered users.

Every Saturday of each playing period of ten weeks, there will be one winner of £30 cash for each completed sheet of 59 balls. The winner will be the person who has the number corresponding to the Bonus Ball drawn on the Saturday night's National Lottery. This means that for an outlay of £10 a player has ten chances of winning £30. Several games, each



consisting of 59 allocated numbers, can run in the same ten week period.

Since all proceeds will be for the Provincial Grand Charity, the more sheets of 59 balls sold for each ten week period, the more the Provincial Grand Charity will benefit.

As ever, and only if you are able, I ask that you consider a little extra giving to support all our charitable efforts that are showing Freemasonry in such a positive light.

We all sincerely hope that this year will soon see life in general, and Freemasonry in particular, return to normal. In the meantime, may you and your families remain safe and well.

Echoes from Portugal

The Lodge of the Oldest Ally 9524 was consecrated on 22nd October 1993. Its first WM was the late VW.Bro Peter Kitson, PGSwdB, and the chair is currently occupied by a Portuguese surgeon. It is quite unique not only because meets twice a year in two different countries, but because it celebrates friendship between two nations that have ancient political, commercial and cultural relations.

We are experiencing a public health emergency decreed by the World Health Organisation (COVID 19). The numbers of infected people do not stop to grow both in Portugal as well in England.

The Lodge of the Oldest Ally decided, with the consent of the provincial authorities, early in the course of the pandemic crisis to suspend the May 2020 meeting, which proved to be a wise decision.

In Portugal the lodge meetings were suspended

by the middle of March, and it is not known yet when they will be resumed. Many Brethren meet online to assist to videoconferences, webinars, podcasts and have access to digital libraries.

Anyway we are not still. Many masons are involved in this fight in hospitals, fire departments, police stations and social security centres... Others, who are teachers, are helping children that are confined and have school at home.

The Regular Grand Lodge of Portugal (GLLP) offered 10,000 face visors to the Portuguese Firemen League (437 firemen associations) who with the most altruistic sacrific



protect the population every day. It also promoted a blood donation campaign as an action of solidarity.

We all hope to soon say "Happy to meet again!"


Initiation Ceremony of Ancient Blacksmiths

Life in the Middle Ages was punctuated by the Mysteries, Miracle Plays and Moralities, which were dramas enacted representing biblical, legendary and allegorical subjects, and were most popular during the time the cathedrals and churches were being built, and indeed lingered long after the reformation.

These Mysteries (meaning skills or crafts) or Miracle Plays were an annual event and often Guilds were designated to play certain dramas year after year. These were performed to a largely illiterate populace. The operative Guilds were widespread during the middle ages having had a great influence on the general population of that time. The Free Masons

were not the only workers Guild to have their own initiation ceremony. Two trades that have been always closely associated with the Free Masons, namely the Carpenters and Blacksmiths, each had their own. Although these colourful ceremonies have long been consigned to history, it is curious to consider what initiates had to endure.

The medieval Masons regarded their initiate as a rough piece of stone to be squared and polished and marked so that he should be fit to take his place in the intended structure. The Carpenters' regarded their initiate as a rough tree to be felled and barked and made into a shapely piece of timber. The Blacksmiths' regarded their initiate as a rough piece of pig iron to be forged and tempered. They all illustrate the journey of an unskilled man becoming a master craftsman. His apprenticeship would include being taught to read and write at a time



of high illiteracy in the general population. So, the significance to a candidate of his initiation was of life-changing significance.

The Masons' Ceremony was more polished and complete than the other two, with a deeper symbolism and meaning and possibly a more ancient origin. It therefore naturally appealed to more cultured men and, in time, more readily lent itself to being the foundation of our speculative rite.

The Guilds of the Blacksmiths and Carpenters have long

been consigned to history, and their graphic ceremonies all but forgotten. What follows is a brief account of the lost Blacksmiths Guild initiation ceremony. The Candidate would be carried into the forae room flat, as if a rough pig of iron. The Blacksmiths are blowing up the forge, and two Master Blacksmiths are sledging away on an anvil, the Candidate was carried a safe distance from the fire as though he was a rough piece of iron being prepared to be worked.

He was then moved close to the anvil. The Master Blacksmith would then instruct two other Master Blacksmiths to tap him very gently with their master's hammer, to signify he was now being transformed. He was partly 'quenched' with water, thus figuratively

forged from rough iron into a finished piece, properly tempered. He was then given his Blacksmith's Apron, hammer, and tongs. A lecture was then given in his honour, which was the traditional history of the Blacksmiths.

Today we consider such graphic dramas as outmoded, and they truly are. However, it will have impressed upon the medieval candidates the full significance of what he would undergo to become an operative master craftsman.

This lecture has been adapted from one delivered in Lodge 3456 in London on 14th October 1914. This, and many more lectures, can be found upon joining the Richard Sandbach Lodge of Research 9600.

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Motor neurone disease

(MND) is a progressive musclewasting disease, with symptoms getting worse over time. It is lifeshortening and there is currently no cure.

Although MND affects people differently, it reduces the ability to walk, talk, eat, drink and breathe. In some cases, it can also change the way people think and behave. The cause is still unknown, despite much extensive and ongoing research.

There is a one in 300 chance of contracting MND, and at any one time there are 5,000 adults living with it in the UK alone. The Motor Neurone Disease Association (MNDA), is a charity close to the hearts of two Peterborough Freemasons - W.Bro Clive Lane, who is living with the disease, and W.Bro Alan Nicholls, whose wife Barbara is

similarly affected.

Although these two men have known each other through Freemasonry for many years, it was a chance conversation in 2018 which led them to realise each other's circumstances and appreciation of the support and care afforded by MNDA.

With this in mind, earlier this year they decided to launch an appeal within the local Masonic community to benefit the charity and raise awareness of this unforaivina disease.

As a result, Freemasons' Lodges in Peterborough have donated £2,400 to the appeal, which has been recognised by the Provincial Grand Charity in authorising a further significant contribution culminating in a total sum of £5.000.

At a socially distanced gathering on Tuesday the 22nd September 2020, W.Bro Clive and W.Bro Alan presented a cheque to MNDA representative, Simon Crooke. Also in attendance were W.Bro Mark Constant (Assistant Provincial Grand Master) and W.Bro Jonathon Hibbins (Provincial Senior Grand Warden), both members of the Provincial Grand Charity committee.

Alan said, "In light of our personal experiences we wished to show our gratitude for the care received thus far, and in the future, by attempting to raise funds to support the MNDA in their endeavours. Our area is covered by the Cambridgeshire branch of the charity and we are indebted to the Peterborough Lodges and Provincial Grand Charity who supported us in our fundraising."

Clive added, "We are overwhelmed at such a magnificent response to our appeal in the Peterborough area and the support given by the Provincial Grand Charity. We would also like to thank those lodges beyond our province with whom we have an association, who have separately donated a further £1,500."

On behalf of MNDA, Simon thanked the Freemasons for their exceptionally generous donation which, in these constrained times, is especially welcome and appreciated.

PSA screening for indications of Prostate problems resumes

One beneficiary of the current Holy Royal Arch PSA testing campaign, financially supported by the Craft, is Abinaton Chapter Treasurer. **Excellent Companion** Michael Branch, who prompted by an invitation to attend an event at Sheaf Close, produced test results that highlighted a need for him to contact his local GP. Following a number of further tests at Ketterina General Hospital he was then transferred to the Oncology Unit at Northampton General Hospital where he commenced Radiotherapy Treatment for Prostate

Cancer which concluded with success on 7th January 2021.

Excellent Companion Michael, shown here ringing the 'Bell' to denote the successful completion of his treatment at Northampton General Hospital Oncology & Haematology Unit, said, "I have been fortunate. My grateful thanks go to the Past Grand Superintendent Wayne Williams for starting the first round of PSA screening in 2017, and to the current Grand Superintendent Jim Boughton for his continuing support with a second round

> which commenced in November 2019". A number of Companions and Brethren around the Province have had similar experiences and have benefited from early indications of a possible problem highlighted by the PSA blood test.

Prostate Cancer UK states that every 45 minutes a man dies of Prostate Cancer in the UK and yet there is no national screening programme. We as Freemasons have been funding research into cancer for many years and in 2004 the Grand Charity sponsored Professor Colin Cooper with £1,000,000 to quickly progress understanding of the causes and treatment of prostate cancer.

The current PSA screening programme commenced Autumn 2019 at Northampton followed by Peterborough in February 2020. However, the Corby session due April 2020 had to be cancelled due to the pandemic. The rest of 2020 saw the development and trials of a home testing kit by the providers, the Fulford Trust, with Excellent Companion Mike Green, continuing regular contact with the Trust awaiting deployment. It is pleasing to report that those who would have been invited to the Corby session of April 2020 have now been contacted with details as to how they may obtain Home Testing Kits.




News From Other Orders


