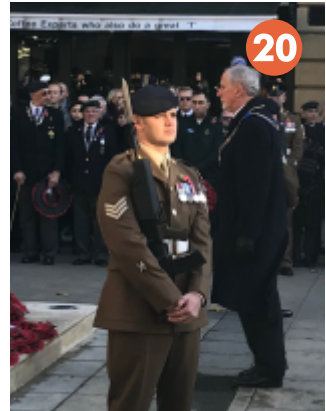

I am currently meeting and talking with our Group Officers to ensure that the trend is terminated and we resume the growth that we need to ensure the future of this very special organisation.

The Tercentenary gave me the opportunity to apply for two additional Grand Rank appointments and also one promotion.

This enabled me to reward the work that W.Bro Ged Dempsey has carried out over a number of years, in particular his amazing efforts with the Three Pillars Feed The Homeless Trust. I was also able to reward W.Bro Barry Howard to acknowledge his fantastic effort in bringing our centre at Sheaf Close into being. Lessons were read by the Provincial Grand Master, RW.Bro Max Bayes, as well as the heads of other orders in the Province including the soon to be outgoing Grand Superintendent, E Comp Wayne Williams

and the Provincial Grand Master for the Mark Degree, WBro Bob Stokes.

Following the service, Peterborough lodges hosted mince pies and refreshments, which were enjoyed by all.

Three Pillars - Just Giving Page Set Up

The ongoing good news stories from the charity continue to highlight the work W.Bro Mick Pescod, W.Bro Ged Dempsey and their team do. Here is Brian's story:

Brian was homeless in Huntingdon, his wife died two years ago and after nursing her for 4 years he was devastated. To add even more pressure his business failed because he devoted his time to his wife's care and ended up in significant debt. This resulted in him losing his house and his mental health deteriorated to a point where he was considering suicide. W.Bro Mick was contacted by someone who works with the Cambridge Homeless about Brian. Mick went to see Brian and asked W.Bro Ged to look to see if The 3 Pillars could assist.

Ged met Brian the following day, and provided him with a mobile phone and some

credit so we could stay in contact with him and be available if he needed us. Ged also contacted the YMCA in Peterborough and arranged to collect Brian to take him for an interview following which he was accepted and given a one bed apartment. The YMCA have arranged his benefits, registered him with a doctor, a dentist, mental health nurse and an optician. The 3 Pillars - feeding the Homeless have provided him with bedding, pots and pans, cutlery and food shopping for the last 3 weeks until his benefits are through. Brian had a nice Christmas and New Year in a warm apartment instead of sleeping in a bus shelter in Huntingdon.

Brian wanted to repay the charity so he set up a 'Just giving page - Amazon' which has been amazing, within the first few days of the site going live the charity received over



£600.00 of donations including sleeping bags, gloves, scarves, socks, toiletries and many other items;

What are these Information Evenings?

The Information Evenings are designed to complement the Initiates' Suppers that take place in the second half of the season because their format is slightly different.

They are focused on a centre and offer the Lodges within each centre the opportunity of having a joint event for gentlemen rather than perhaps struggling to put

one on by themselves. Additionally, it also provides those who have approached us via the internet and been screened by a Group Officer the opportunity to attend.

What is the format?

The host Lodge within the centre would open as normal and conduct their business quickly and efficiently (no more than 30 mins)

While the Lodge conducts its business the gentlemen would be looked after outside

The gentlemen would then be invited into the Lodge and take their seat with their hosts

The presentation is divided into 3 sections: a brief history of Freemasonry, why gentlemen become Freemasons & then three Freemasons explain what they enjoy and get from Freemasonry

Questions and Answers

After this, the gentlemen are able to enjoy a normal Festive Board and experience the social side of Freemasonry which we all enjoy and appreciate.

The 'host' Lodge within the centre or combined centre is usually one which has a gap in their programme to accommodate this Information Evening.

Doug Robinson - A Boy's Own Story

Doug 'Robbie' Robinson, who passed to the Grand Lodge Above in November 2017, had many a 'Boy's Own' Story to tell from his experiences in World War Two.

At the outbreak of the war he joined the home guard, until he eventually signed on with the RAF and became a pilot. He was sent to South Africa for pilot training and on his return the troopship he was aboard was torpedoed and sank.

Subsequently Doug found himself cast adrift in a life raft, without food or fresh water for several days until his rescue.

He saw active service piloting a Handley Page Halifax Bomber on many night raids



over Germany. It was on one of these night raids whilst flying Halifax HX333 that the plane was badly shot up and became impossible to fly, Doug ordered his crew out but they were one parachute short. He said that he would remain to take the plane down, and his flight engineer refused the last parachute too, insisting that he stayed on board with Doug. The plane was successfully crash landed and he and the flight engineer only sustained

minor injuries. He and the rest of the crew were captured by the Germans and spent the rest of the war in a POW camp.

Doug left the RAF in 1948 and resumed his banking career with the TSB. He joined Freemasonry in Spilsby, Leicestershire and became a joining member of St Wilfrid Lodge in our Province in the 1990s.

Portuguese Odyssey: The Lodge of the Oldest Ally 9524

W.Bro David Nicholas of Danetre Lodge writes:

"Compared to the epic voyages of the great Portuguese explorer Vasco da Gama, this was a mere splash in the ocean. But our Masonic Portuguese odyssey has certainly been a pleasurable and often exciting voyage of discovery. Which is why I now recommend it to you.

It all started with a visit to W.Bro Bill Mead back in 2012. Bill surprised me by saying that he and his wife Betty were off to Portugal for a rather different Lodge meeting at The Lodge of the Oldest Ally near Lisbon. I told him over a thousand miles seemed rather a long way to go for a Lodge meeting. But when he explained the details of the trip I realised that it offered the chance of a rather unusual Masonic adventure. And I like adventures!

The Lodge of the Oldest Ally was consecrated at Daventry Masonic Centre in 1993, is run in English to English constitution and is a craft Lodge within our Province.

The Lodge meets twice a year, the first Saturday in May at Daventry Masonic Centre and again on the first Saturday in October in Cascais.

In 2014 I decided to make the effort and visit The Lodge of the Oldest Ally (Portugal is indeed Britain's oldest ally - the Anglo-Portuguese Treaty dates from 1373 and is the oldest alliance in the world that is still in force). It was W.Bro Jack Hirst who planned our trip and my wife Susan and I accompanied Jack and his wife Linda on a flight to Porto a week before the Lodge meeting.

Hiring a car, we wound our way through north and central Portugal staying in a string of fascinating Pousadas (often old and historic buildings which have been transformed into very comfortable hotels – the Portuguese version of Spain's Paradores). In Obidos we stayed in a castle overlooking the town's cobbled street and enjoyed Obidos's sweet after-dinner treat – Cherry Liqueur!

When we arrived in Cascais

(a smart seaside resort 30 kilometres to the west of Lisbon) we were met by the Portuguese Brethren who very kindly took the time to show us some of Lisbon's historic sights. Lying on the banks of the River Tagus, the Portuguese capital is one of the oldest cities in the world. It was from here that Vasco da Gama set out on his 16th century voyages of discovery (he was the first European explorer to reach India by sea). But more of Lisbon later.

We were made to feel so welcome that we couldn't wait to get back. So fast-forward to our return last year.



In mid-September my wife and I took Brittany Ferries' from Plymouth to Santander,



ensuring we were fully refreshed to enjoy our journey though central Spain, which has so much to offer. Especially the amazing aqueduct the Romans built in Segovia over 2000 years ago. The City of Merida (The furthest west the Romans settled) is a gem of Roman history. Even a Ben Hur type arena!

With the top down on our 2 seater and the warm air running through our hair we headed further south through Cordoba and on to the Costa del Sol. We stayed with friends who have an apartment on the coast. After all the culture there was nothing like a cold beer at a beach café lasting 5 days!

Heading north west and over the frontier into Portugal the temperature hit 37 degrees so a good meal and rest in a

charming B&B in the beautiful Portuguese town of Serpa created a very special oasis for us. Recharged we headed the-our final destination over 150 miles away in Lisbon.

A highlight of our time in Lisbon was a journey over the rooftops in a ski lift type gondola to arrive at an amazing Aquarium.

It was built on stilts in water and contained 32 separate aquariums, the largest of which contained over 2.5 million litres of salted water.

We were guided though Sharks, Rays, and a multitude of fascinating creatures. Our very knowledgeable English speaking guide explained the whole underwater world that surrounded us.

Then just a short walk to a Brazilian restaurant for dinner along with a kick from a very refreshing iced Brazilian liquid!

The Lodge meeting was held on the Saturday afternoon where W.Bro Dr A.F.D. Paiva Master of The Lodge Of The Oldest Ally conducted the Lodge Business. (All done in English). Following the meeting we joined the ladies for a drink before Brethren and guests enjoyed a more formal festive board, with a



very special warmth that only Brethren and guests from two nations can produce.

I was so pleased I had met W.Bro Bill Mead that day in 2012. We have been to Lisbon on Masonic business three times now, feel we have some very good friends there and have already joined the Lodge and booked our trip for next October.

The next meeting of the Lodge Of The Oldest Ally will be the installation meeting on the afternoon of Saturday 6th May at The Daventry Masonic Centre W.Bro Mike Green is the Lodge Secretary.

I will perhaps see you all in Daventry for the May installation meeting or next October in Lisbon."

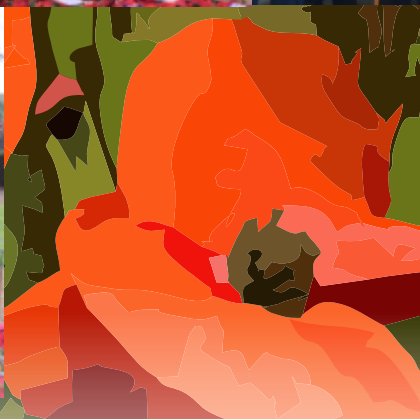

The level of Provincial support gave the event a huge boost; there were five Grand Officers present, twenty-six brethren from within the Province, and

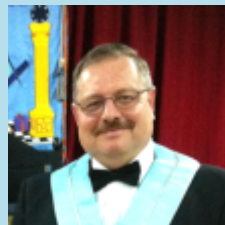
twenty-six members of sister lodges.

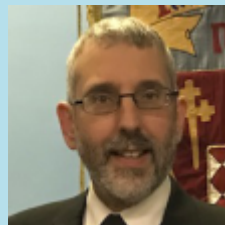

Stamford Masonic Centre Improvements

The Stamford Masonic Centre draws many admiring comments from Masons and visitors alike. It is a fine old building that, not surprisingly, needs constant care and attention if it is to continue to serve us into the future. To ensure continuous improvement the committee has taken steps to protect its future by announcing several new works. The building itself is in a conservation area therefore any such works have to be carefully planned to comply with the uniqueness of its surroundings. The building was previously the Bluecoat School before it was purchased for £15,000 by Stamford Masons in 1977. The layout has significantly changed since that time to make it into a functioning Masonic centre. But its not just Masons who benefit from what the SMC has to offer. The past year has also seen over fifty commercial events. The building works, which will be carried out progressively

over the next twelve months, include replacement of the windows in the main dining hall.

Also, the committee have come up with novel approaches to recruit Masons into this improvement activity. There are discussions that will have volunteers form a Lodge Rental Review Committee to inform and direct future financial planning for the SMC as a whole. Lodges have also organised numerous events that encourage further use of the facilities we share. These include a St. George's Day Carvery organised by Vale of Welland Lodge and a 'Fur and Feather' dinner organised by Good Intent Rose Croix.

Recently the SMC hosted the third annual Stamford Inter Craft Lodge Quiz. There were six Craft Lodge teams who competed for the Challenge Shield, which was won by a team from the Lodge of Merit. Proceedings included an excellent

Farewell and Thank You E Companion Wayne....



The 31st January 2018 was the day the curtain came down on the tenure of E Comp Wayne Edward Williams as the Most Excellent Grand Superintendent over the Holy Royal Arch in the Province.

He was only the 12th Grand Superintendent of this Province, and by his own admission, his Holy Royal Arch career prior to May 2007 had been somewhat less than spectacular – his focus had invariably been on his Craft involvements as Assistant Provincial Grand Master and Provincial Grand Secretary. By contrast, during his tenure as Grand Superintendent, his achievements have been more than spectacular. In those early days when speaking to Craft Masons who were not Companions, he would often remind them that he knew who they were and where they lived; the phrase has become embedded in the Province and

there are few who would not associate the expression with the Grand Superintendent.

As leader of the Holy Royal Arch Province, he brought his energy and enthusiasm to bear in everything that he did for the Order, keeping his promise from his Installation that he would take the Holy Royal Arch forward by a process of evolution rather than revolution and that "What you see is what you get!"

In May 2011, he was appointed as one of two sitting Grand Superintendents to the Committee of General Purposes of Supreme Grand Chapter.

At the Convocation of Installed First Principals, the Province was able to present a cheque for £65,000, as part of the Royal College of Surgeons appeal during the Royal Arch Bicentenary. This was a fundraising effort that our Grand Superintendent spearheaded with his usual passion which was instrumental in securing such an outstanding achievement.

His excellent relationship with his counterpart in the Province of Bristol was central to bring a demonstration of the Ceremony of the Veils to this Province for what was a memorable evening for all those in attendance - it qualified under the daily advancement in Masonic knowledge.

E Comp Wayne was honoured to become the First Principal of

Probity Chapter of Chapter of Probity in the Province of Cambridgeshire – membership of this prestigious Chapter is restricted to Grand Superintendents, their Deputies and other senior Royal Arch Masons predominantly based in the Eastern Provinces. He is currently First Principal of the Peace and Harmony Chapter in the Province of Warwickshire which serves a similar purpose for the Royal Arch Provinces in the West Midlands and beyond. Technology has held no fear for our Grand Superintendent as he has taken to Twitter or as he prefers to call it Interwit to spread the Holy Royal Arch message.

One of his major achievements, is rewriting and producing a Welcome To Royal Arch Brochure which is given to all Exalteés; this took many rewrites but it is so good at helping the new Exalteé start to understand the Holy Royal Arch that it has been adopted by other Provinces. This brochure is coupled with the informative Next Step For A Master Mason leaflet which helps to explain to the Master Mason why the Holy Royal Arch is the completion of their journey in Pure Antient Masonry.

The HRA will be forever grateful and appreciative of the tremendous contribution and efforts of E Comp Wayne Williams as its Grand Superintendent. We wish you a very enjoyable retirement and
