We hear so much about the decline in Masonic membership and I know that some Provinces are struggling to maintain levels. I watch our membership levels very carefully and each month review the year on year situation. I am most pleased to report that our overall numbers continue to increase.

The increase in the year to 31 May 2017 was six and at the end of June 2017 it was shown as four. Not massive numbers in a net membership of around 3,300, but I believe that it is

significant in that we are no longer declining. Please keep up the excellent work.

Many Provinces are concerned about the condition of their buildings. I perceive that in the late

Victorian times and through to the beginnings of the 20th Century, Lodges generally met in pubs and tayerns. The Order was at that time so successful that it was thought prudent to construct dedicated Masonic buildings. These buildings are now more than a hundred years old and suffer from increasing maintenance costs, made more difficult with a reducing membership. I am so relieved that in our Province we have few such problems. Corby, Towcester, Peterborough, Huntingdon and, of

course, Northampton are all new or at least modern buildings.
Centres such as Kettering, Rushden,
Wellingborough,
Thrapston and St Ives, whilst older buildings, are well maintained and controlled by an efficient management team.

Brethren, we commence another Masonic season in good heart, in good situations with our buildings and with our membership numbers and therefore with much confidence for the future. I look forward to meeting and talking with you on my visits around the Province.

Latest From Provincial Membership Officer

Many members have asked me how the Sky1 series impacted our enquiry levels; it's fair to say that there was a healthy uplift in the number of enquiries that we received during the series and shortly afterwards. Time will tell how many of these enquiries turn into members.

By the end of last season, the Provincial Grand Master and I had met with the Group Officers in each of our centres. We listened to the challenges as well as the success stories and these very positive meetings have enabled me to produce a list of best practice for introducing new members which was approved at the Group & Grand Officers' Forum in May. Your Lodge Secretary will have received a copy in his pack at the Secretaries' meeting.

Some of the points you may like to reflect on are

below, to be clear, these are not compulsory, but, are recommended from successful use by Lodges in our Province:



Expectations and
Commitments: A
gentleman should
understand from a very
early stage what the
commitments are in terms
of time and money as
well as what we expect
from him should he
become a Freemason,
but, by the same token
we should be
communicating what he
can expect from the
members of the Lodge in

terms of support and encouragement. These expectations and commitments can be discussed prior to the formal interview as well as during the formal interview - if we do not explain what the these are then there's a very real risk of misunderstandings arising from both sides which will not end well.

Family: It is important to make sure that a prospective candidate's family are aware of his intentions to become a Freemason and are supportive. This can be achieved by involving his family in any social events prior to joining and/or meeting with him at his home. This is an opportunity to answer any questions that the candidate's family may have so that better understand what Freemasonry is, what it isn't and again what is involved.

Formal Interview: The suggestion is that the formal interview should be made up of 3 to 4 people and those people should be chosen for their ability to be effective interviewers rather than their seniority within the Lodge. Each person who takes part in the interview should understand what questions they are asking. If the prospective candidate candidate has

attended a number of social events then members have had the opportunity to meet him and to flag any concerns they may have which then removes the need for them to attend. Let's not forget that people would not expect to interview in front of more than three people for a job. A large panel of interviewers can be overwhelming and daunting.

After the interview, the Lodge Secretary might like to circulate a note to his members advising how the interview went and share a little background on the prospective candidate.

UGLE has a Social Media policy that states that members should not "identify anyone else as a Freemason without his explicit consent." Clearly that went wrong in this case - no explicit permissions were sought or gained from the Initiate or indeed from any other Brethren present at the meeting. It is imperative that any postings on Facebook and Tweets are removed

with immediate effect and that further content is not published on social or any other media.

There are a set of approved Social Media Guidelines and these are available from myself or Provincial Office.

Let us not forget those passing to the Grand Lodge Above

It is with great sadness that we report the passing to the Grand Lodge Above of these distinguished and highly regarded Brethren.

RWBro H. Brian Smith, aged 85 years, a Past Provincial Grand Master of this Province from July 1990 to June 1997.

RWBro Brian, a chartered accountant by profession, was initiated into Lodge of Perseverance No. 455 in March 1957 and exalted into the Holy Royal Arch in September 1971. Prior to taking-up the appointment as Provincial Grand Master, RWBro Brian was Deputy Provincial Grand Master from 1984 to 1990; he was

also acting Provincial Grand Treasurer from 1979 to 1984. RWBro Brian attained his first Grand rank in 1983 when he was promoted to PAGDC. He was further promoted to PGSwdB in 1985, and was a Grand Steward from 2005 to 2006. In 1999, shortly after his tenure ended as Provincial Grand Master, RWBro Brian became President of

the RMBI, a post he served until 2004.

RWBro Brian was also a Grand Officer in the Holy Royal Arch. He attained the rank of PAGSoj in 1991 and was promoted to GScN in 1997.

RWBro Brian was an extremely hard-working, well-liked and well-respected Mason. He will be sorely missed by all who knew him.



VWBro David Manners PDepProvGM PGSwdB

passed away on the 28th of June 2017. He was 84 years old. VWBro Manners was initiated into Beneventa Lodge No. 2380 on the 12th Worshipful Master in 1969. He was subsequently elected as an honorary member. He was also a founder and elected honorary member of Coritani Lodge No. 8079 and Dan<u>etre Lodge No.</u> 8594. He was appointed Provincial Deputy Grand Director of Ceremonies in 1974, Provincial Grand Director of Ceremonies in 1975, Assistant Provincial Deputy Provincial Grand Master in 1990. He was made a Grand Officer in 1976 when he received the rank of Past Assistant Grand Director of Ceremonies. He was further promoted to Past Senior Grand Deacon in 1989 and Past Grand Sword Bearer in 1991. He was also a Grand receiving the rank of Past Grand Standard Bearer in

WBro Rev Canon Frank Eustace Pickard, PAGChap passed away on Wednesday 5 July 2017 at the age of 86. WBro Pickard was initiated into De La Pre Lodge 8 February 1979 becoming Worshipful Master in 1985. He served the Lodge as Chaplain on three separate occasions. Outside of this Province, he was also a member of Forest Hill their Worshipful Master in 1992. He was also a member of Grand Junction Lodge and an Honorary Member of several Lodges. WBro Pickard was honoured Grand Rank in 1987 when Assistant Grand Chaplain. He received a first Provincial appointment in 1988 when he was appointed as Provincial Grand Chaplain, a post that he held for 5 years. In 2008, he was reappointed as Provincia Grand Chaplain for a further extremely active in the Holy Royal Arch and held office in Supreme Grand Chapter.


WBro Peter Jones PSGD passed away at the Great Western Hospital, Swindon on Monday 28 August 2017. With his lifelong friend WBro Dennis Rideout, he was initiated in the Lodge of Remembrance, who meet in Swindon in the Province of Wiltshire on 1st April 1964. He progressed through the various offices and became Worshipful Master in 1981.

His work in the house building industry took him to Northampton. There, on 25 March 1991, he became a joining member of Grey Friars Lodge No 4990. On 3rd August 1992 he became a founder member of Sulgrave Lodge which meets at Rushden and became its Worshipful Master in 2001. He achieved Grand Rank in 2004 and was promoted to Past Senior Grand Deacon in 2005. In a distinguished Masonic career, an appointment as the Assistant Provincial Grand Master of Wiltshire on 7th October In 2014 he received from both his home Province of Wiltshire and also this Province Jubilee Certificates marking his 50 years in Freemasonry.

All these distinguished Brethren will be sorely missed and we pass on our condolences to their family and friends.

LEUKAEMIA – CAN YOU HELP?

Many years ago a diagnosis of leukaemia was to end in certain death for the patient, but over the years chemotherapy has advanced and alona with stem cell transplant techniques and selective radiotherapy, in some cases, even at a late stage, there is now hope of a recovery. The current treatment involves killing off the cancerous blood cells and introducing new stem cells from a suitable donor - a full bone marrow transplant. Hopefully new blood cells will regenerate following the healthy pattern of the new stem cells which are infused into the blood It is even better if a diagnosis is made early when defective blood cells (Lymphoma



or Myeloma) can be identified which will later develop into leukaemia. In this case the ideal treatment is similar in principle but the cells introduced are an exact match with the patient from a willing donor. You can imagine that this "exact matching process" can take time and most of all it depends on volunteers offering their blood. A auick match is obtained by a simple mouth swab, when DNA is examined and compared with patients who are awaiting treatment. If a likely match is found then further blood tests are

carried out to refine this possible match. If all is suitable and the ten criteria needed in the donor DNA matches the patient. then the treatment can be undertaken. For a donor, treatment usually involves having two pints of blood passed through a machine which is then immediately returned to the donor's body. A fairly simple process which is not painful nor too uncomfortable. Presently the success rate is improvina as there are now millions of donors worldwide.

It has come to our knowledge that one of our Brethren in Northampton has a 33 year old daughter who has been diagnosed with Myelodysplastic Syndrome (MDS) and found herself in the situation of needing a donor for treatment. the abnormal blood cells having been found early during a routine blood test while pregnant with her daughter, who was born in October 2015.

The final diagnosis took until last June, but it is now confirmed.

Can anyone help by volunteering to become a donor and possibly save a life? You need to be 18 to 50 years of age, in good health and prepared to give a mouth swab.

Perhaps if you fall outside these criteria other members of your family might be willing to help. It is really important that those who are able and suitable volunteer.

Thank you all in advance for your help, you may not be suitable for the specific patient we know, but it could help someone and save a life!




If you canoe to the woods today.....

Did you know just how much information is on the Provincial Website? Did you know we had a Webmaster? We caught up with our very own Spiderman, WBro Simon Key, and asked the questions you wanted answers to:

A Little Bit of Background It's been a while since I took over

It's been a while since I took over the role of Provincial Webmaster. Since then I've tried hard to build on the fantastic work of my predecessor, WBro Gerry Crawford.

Before I answer some frequentlyasked questions about the website, I must thank three very hard-working Brethren who play a big part in keeping the website running –

WBro Andy Ward, who handles user registrations, WBro Rob Taylor and WBro

Wild Rob Taylor and Wild Wild Michael Genner, who assist with content publication.

What's It All About?

The Provincial website is the natural evolution of the Password newsletter but with some important differences. Firstly, unlike Password, which is released twice yearly and is comparatively expensive to publish, the website is cheap to maintain, fast and easy to

update, and versatile. We can distribute text, pictures, documents, sound and video clips. News articles are normally published within 24-hours. Secondly, we can control who sees what and when. This allows us to promote Freemasonry to the public whilst keeping our private stuff, well, private. Finally, and perhaps most importantly, it's interactive. You can use it to contact the Provincial office, chat with other members using the online discussion forum, search the membership-database, query the Lodge directory, download Provincial communications and much more

Do I Need a User Account to Access the Website?

No, but without one you won't be able to use the website's most useful functionality.

Is the Website Difficult to Use? That really depends on your level of experience.

To be fair, if you don't use computers very much you will find it challenging. That said, (a) you can't break anything and (b) we're always here to help. It's best to try and treat it as a learning experience and remember that many others are

experiencing the same difficulties as you. You're not alone!

I've Tried Resetting My Website User Name and/or Password but It Doesn't Work!

User-name reminders and reset passwords are sent by email to the address associated with your website account. If you no longer have access to that account you won't receive the emails sent. Also, be sure to check your spam/junk email-folders as we find that many of the emails sent to users from the website end-up there. Don't hesitate to contact us if you're starting to pull your hair out!

24th June 1717 – A night to remember
