THE RICHARD SANDBACH LECTURE

Giving the first of what is to be a series of Richard Sandbach lectures in Lodge 9600, on 22 February RW Bro Sandbach OSM PPrGM explained how Scouting and Army service had led him into Freemasonry and shaped his

view of its future. He was 23 when war was declared in 1939 and his father had been killed in action in 1917. He enlisted as a Private soldier in October and was 'demobbed' as a Major in 1946 having served in a machine gun regiment Northern Ireland and as a staff officer in England, Europe and India. latterly Airborne Forces. After moving tributes in verse to his father's generation and his own, he ended his talk by explaining how all this had led him into the Craft:

the humour, the sense of common purpose and - yes - an idealism I had known in it and even more in that six and a half years in the Army. I saw Freemasonry as perhaps helping to regain them and now, almost sixty years on, increasingly feel

that they are far **important** more than ceremonial and ritual, and that we must always take care that we are not only practising brotherly love, relief and truth but are helping each other to enjoy - and I stress that word - to enjoy doing so. This talk, I hope, explains why I have come to ritual and see ceremonial as the servants of our teaching, not its their master. important but only purpose being to see that everything

'I was 23 when my army career began, 29 when it ended - a long time for a young man - and I still had to face my final exams before I could start to earn a living. I did not return to Scouting, but I missed the comradeship,

which should be done is done in order and with dignity.

There are for me three things which are basic: the teaching, which we summarise

Another happy and successful Masonic year drew to a close in May following most enjoyable and well supported meetings of Provincial Grand Lodge and Three Counties. It was a year in which the Province achieved a modest increase in members together with an encouraging trend in enhanced membership retention. These trends have undoubtedly emerged as a result of improved Recruitment and Mentoring practices and I urge all our Lodges to build on this very real success. Several changes have also taken place in the Provincial Executive team. Firstly the retirement of Deputy PGM, VW Bro Derek Young who has given many years of exceptional service to the Province. His major input into the re-structuring of our Education and Training programme will surely have a lasting impact. We will of course have the benefit of VW Bro Derek's continued involvement in Provincial affairs as our first Provincial Grand Orator.

Newly invested Deputy PGM, W Bro Max Bayes now takes over as Chairman of the Provincial Grand Charity and will continue his leadership of the hugely successful cross-Province 2013 Festival Appeal Committee. We can certainly expect the Committee to maintain a constant flow of exciting and enjoyable fund raising activities during the course of the Appeal. As our new Assistant PGM, W Bro Dr Vivian Thomas has particular responsibility, in collaboration with W Bro Reg Hirst, for guiding our future Education and Training programmes. W Bro Vivian will also succeed W Bro Max Bayes in organising our now traditional Christmas Service of Lessons and Carols in Peterborough Cathedral.

Senior Assistant PGM, W Bro Wayne Williams will continue his key roles as Teddies for Loving Care "supremo" - a wonderfully successful project - and implementation, of our "White Table" recruitment programme. As our new Grand Superintendent, W Bro Wayne will also be seeking to further strengthen the indissoluble link between the Craft and the Royal Arch in our journey through Pure Ancient Masonry.

Our new team will certainly continue its efforts to ensure happy and successful Freemasonry within Northamptonshire and Huntingdonshire. Over the last three years I have particularly sought the close involvement of the Executive, Grand Officers and our Lodges in designing and promoting effective candidate "Recruitment" and "Retention" programmes. The third of our Masonic "3R's" is of course "Retrieval" - most especially Retrieval of members who, for one or more reasons, feel unable to continue regularly attending their Lodge meetings. But how do we achieve success in this so vital area? Lodge Almoners, all dedicated and unsung heroes, do a superb job in seeking out "distress" in all its forms and endeavouring to provide appropriate relief, whether financial or by caring time, to alleviate that distress. Such a level of support demonstrates,

as always, the tremendous work of the Lodge Almoners. Nevertheless one still suspects that this is but the tip of an iceberg and that there are other dimensions of support which we need to identify and provide.

More specifically, given that Lodge attendances fluctuate in the region of 60-70% of membership, can we identify those brethren who have simply stopped regular attendance at Lodge meetings and then identify the reasons underlying their absences. Reasons can range from Brethren of advancing years simply being not well enough to make regular journeys to Lodge during winter months to Brethren who, by not being regularly involved in the Lodge's ceremonial, administrative or social affairs have lost their enthusiasm for Freemasonry.

Whatever the reason for a Brother's absence, it is so important that we identify them. Chances are that the Lodge will be able to do something about the problem and to help the member to once again enjoy his freemasonry on a regular basis. But, I hear the cry, how can the Lodge, and especially the hard pressed Almoner find the time to explore the reasons for each and every absence.

We all know the old adage that every member of the Lodge is also an Assistant Almoner. How can we make that work in practice? There may of course be several solutions to the problem depending on Lodge circumstances but might I commend a particular solution practiced with great success by some Lodges within and outside our Province. That route is for Lodge Committees to help the Almoner to form his own - very small - Almoner's Committee of say three or four Brethren whose task it is to ensure, through active liaison with the Lodge Secretary, that they are aware of those Brethren who are regularly absent from Lodge meetings. A starting point may even be to back-track say four to five years to ensure that the list is comprehensive and up-to-date. Even to note those who have resigned from the Lodge.

A system can then be worked out for members of the Almoner's Committee either by telephone, by post, or even better by personal visit, to contact absent Brethren and identify reasons for their regular absences. In so doing I feel sure that whilst in many cases reasons are understandable and unavoidable, for example those of temporary family or business pressures, for others there will be a good chance that having understood the reasons for absence then solutions to those problems can be found. In so doing we may enable those Brethren to once again enjoy regular Masonry and become an active and valued member of the Lodge.

Yes - good practice procedures for Recruitment and Retention are two very important elements for building and sustaining our wonderful Order but the third Masonic "R", Retrieval, is surely of equal importance in ensuring a happy and thriving Lodge in which our Grand Principals of Brotherly Love, Relief and Truth are actively pursued and implemented.

Listen carefully to the Address to the Master with its reminder that a Freemason is to be

known to the world - not just to other Freemasons - as one 'to whom the distressed may prefer their suit, whose hand is guided by justice and whose heart is expanded by benevolence'. Remember too what Baden-Powell called 'stickability'; never give up - as the motto on my arms has it 'Fight On". At the susequent dinner, the PGM on Bro Sandbach's behalf, presented a copy of the official report on the 1937 International Scout lamboree in Holland to the Provincial Grand Secretary.

The bands were conducted by W Bro David Read of Samuel Pepys Lodge, who is internationally renowned as a musician, conductor and adjudicator of Brass Band competitions. The evening was closed by the Provincial Grand Master, RW Bro Barrie Hall thanking all who took part for an excellent evening of entertainment.



Following the Concert, the 2013 RMBI Festival Chairman, W Bro Max Bayes, announced that the amount raised would be in excess of £7,500 and extended his thanks to everyone who attended for giving the event such great support.

During a recent address, the Deputy Provincial Grand Master and Festival Chairman W Bro Max Bayes, announced how delighted he was that, after just over a year since the launch, the Province has achieved in excess of £650,000 towards its target. He also advised that there would be many initiatives in future months to raise extra funds. The two recent events, the Provincial Band Concert and Variety Show had both been most successful.



During the next Masonic season we will have Provincial Diaries and the launch of a Grand Draw. He hoped Brethren would support the Festival by purchasing diaries at a cost of only £5 each and also tickets in the Grand Draw. This has a first prize of a car and many others including a holiday, television and dinner for 12 people.



A Notable Occasion for Wentworth Lodge No 737

Wentworth Lodge No 1039 was consecrated on 12th April 1858 and celebrated its sesquicentennial (150th) anniversary, as Wentworth Lodge No. 737, at the one thousand two hundred and thirty ninth meeting on 14th April 2008 with 61 Brethren in attendance.

There were twenty four members and amongst the thirty seven visitors were the Provincial Grand Master, RW Bro Barrie Hall, together with W Bro Max Bayes and W Bro Wayne Williams, the Assistant Provincial Grand Masters. There was one other special guest from Sheffield and that was W Bro Rodney Holdsworth the Worshipful Master of the other Wentworth Lodge No. 1239. As far as the Lodge knows these are the only two Wentworth Lodges but there used to be a third, Wentworth Lodge No 89 of the United Grand Lodge of New South Wales; unfortunately that Lodge went out of existence when it had to surrender its warrant on the 17th August 1994 just thirteen years after its own centenary.



At the sesquicentennial Lodge Meeting the circumstances leading to the formation of the Lodge together with the minutes of consecration ceremony were described by the Secretary. The Assistant Secretary then read the minutes of the Lodge held one hundred and fifty years ago and the Worshipful Master W Bro I S Hollis described some of the many landmarks that Wentworth Lodge had achieved over the past 150 years.

At the Festive Board the Provincial Grand Master, after responding to his toast, proposed a toast to the Lodge which was in turn responded to by W Bro Terry Adams, the longest serving member in attendance that evening. Before the PGM sat down W Bro Trevor Baldry presented RW Bro Barrie with a cheque for £5000 which represented the Lodge's second instalment towards the 2013 Festival.

Grand Lodge Appointments & Promotions - 2008

On Wednesday 30th April two Brethren of our Province were honoured at the Annual Investiture with a first Appointment to Grand Rank by the Grand Master. They were W Bros James Boughton of Heigham Lodge No 8486 and Robert Pues of Lodge of Merit No 466; regret no picture this year but they will appear in the Year Book.

Jubilee Certificate - W Bro Richard Caton, Ailwyn Lodge


At Ailwyn Lodge in early April the Provincial Grand Master, RW Bro Barrie Hall, invited W Bro Richard Caton to join him on the floor of the Lodge. He began by congratulating W Bro Caton on achieving the landmark of fifty years in Masonry; although the actual date was April 17th the present day could be regarded as a kind of official birthday prior to that. The PGM identified 1958 with famous names, such as Krushchev and Fuchs, the creation of Prince Charles as Prince of Wales and the opening of Gatwick airport.

In the fifty years since,W Bro Richard has made signal contributions to Lodge affairs and the PGM went on to read the contents of the Certificate marking these achievements. Initiated by his father, he had twice been Treasurer of the Lodge for lengthy periods, succeeding his father in that office and gaining a number of



Provincial promotions. He was also a member of Old Reptonians Lodge 3725. He had been a member of St Ivo Chapter, into which he was exalted in 1971, and was a founder member of Ailwyn Chapter; as Treasurer of Ailwyn Chapter he had initially made a profit of 39 pence! His many achievements have justifiably earned him the respect of the Brethren.

Responding, W Bro Richard pointed out that he had enjoyed the advantage of starting young - as a Lewis, initiated at the age of 23. He thanked the PGM and all the Brethren for honouring him. The presentation was greeted with much applause.

Developments in The Holy Royal Arch


There interesting developments afoot within the Royal Arch Province which I trust will be of interest both to existing Companions as well as those contemplating membership of the Royal Arch as their next essential step.

Whilst the Preliminary Declaration in the Book of Constitutions - as agreed by the 1813 Act of Union between the two rival Grand Lodges, the Antients and the Moderns - clearly states that the Holy Royal Arch is considered an integral part of Antient Freemasonry, the statement was designed as a constitutional compromise designed to appease both parties who held slightly differing views at that time. Changes since have been few and far between but a clearer definition is now long overdue to consolidate the positioning of the Holy Royal Arch within Pure Antient Masonry and its indissoluble link with the Craft.

Lest we forget, ours is the defining moment where the Royal Arch brings a happy and joyful conclusion to the events which have previously unfurled in the 3rd Degree ceremony in the Little wonder therefore that both Craft. Supreme Grand Chapter and Grand Lodge itself now look to re-affirm the positioning of the Holy Royal Arch as "an integral part of Antient Freemasonry being the completion of Craft Masonry and the essential next step for every Master Mason" The Royal Arch can justly be claimed therefore to be the foundation and the keystone of the whole Masonic structure - the fulfilment of Pure Antient Masonry without which no Brother can consider his Masonic knowledge complete.

To this end, two new, explanatory leaflets have produced emphasise been to this unquestionable bond between the Craft and the Holy Royal Arch. A simple introduction to the Royal Arch will be set out in a leaflet which will be presented to every Master Mason as soon as possible after the Craft meeting at

which he has been raised to the Third Degree. This will include an invitation to consider exaltation into Chapter when the importance and the

implications of the three Degrees in Craft are better understood. The invitation will again be extended, formally on this occasion, after presentation of the Grand Lodge Certificate in the form of a joint letter signed by both the Provincial Grand Master and the Grand Superintendent, explaining how the Royal Arch should be considered the logical progression towards the completion of advancement.

Then, with a clearer appreciation and a Royal Arch Grand Officer as "mentor", the second of the two new booklets comes into play after exaltation into the Holy Royal Arch - similar to the objectives of the "Peterborough" booklets, it is designed to give a clear explanation of the exaltation ceremony, its implications and how it completes the teachings of the three Degrees in Craft which have preceded it.

The School at Mile 36

On a visit to Freetown Sierre Leone in 2005, as part of a group working to extend a Clinic operated by Mercy Ships in an area known as Aberdeen, Bro David Wallwork became aware of the physical and emotional problems associated with life in this poverty stricken and war ravaged country.

At one point he was asked to go 'up country' to collect some food and it was at a farm that he saw an opportunity for a recently retired secondary head teacher to make a difference. It was a fairly extensive, very primitive subsistence farm at a place only referred to as 'the farm at mile 36'. There was no school, indeed no education for any of the 100+ youngsters living there; the nearest school was two hours walk away. Working with the tribal elders he got them to agree to provide the land, and was fortunate enough to meet a builder named Abdullai Kallon, a well known local man with excellent references, who was willing to help. Now Abdullai is supervising the building of a school which will be the best in the area with five classrooms, toilets and a football pitch.

On return to the UK, it was decided that raising funds to support the building project would be a complete family affair and they chose David School as it was a name often used within the family and, as a biblical word, the local people knew it and will be easily able to say it. The actual fundraising has been shared between the family, with help from friends and various organisations, including The Vale of Nene Lodge No 7006 of which Bro David is a member.



He has been back, to check progress, which has moved on considerably since the above photo was taken. There is still some way to go but in the not too distant future Bro David hopes to be going back soon to officially open the school. As well as money, collection of school uniforms, shoes, football kit, chalk and slates is now ongoing and a shipper has been found who has agreed to move equipment out there which is a great help. This project will make a significant difference to the lives of these children and provide them with opportunities which, in this country, we take for granted but which would not otherwise be available to them.

The Fittest Mason in the Province?

Bro Keith Rumbold of Ferraria Lodge No 8489 can undoubtedly lay claim to being the fittest Mason in the Province. Last year he completed a tremendous effort of endurance by finishing the Himalayan Endurance Race - a little matter of five marathons in five days. The third of which entailed no less a feat than running around Mount Everest!

He received very well earned total sponsorship of £5,500 - £2000 from the Provincial Grand Charity, £1,500 from Corby Masons and £2000 from various non-Masonic sources. Three years ago he ran the London marathon raising £2000 for the local Lakelands Hospice. Bro Keith's fund raising efforts over the past 20 years have been officially recognised by the award of the MBE for which he is to be heartly congratuled.

ORATORS AND ORATIONS

The Orator Scheme, being a revival of Lodge Orators, is a vehicle to stimulate curiosity, to give a better understanding of the philosophy, to encourage study/discussion of Freemasonry and is part of the Retention Strategy. Orations have been, and will be, written to enhance rather than replace the lessons contained in the Rituals and Lectures. They are individual, freestanding, short talks of no more than ten minutes. Each Oration will focus on a particular aspect of the Craft and a deeper meaning of the ritual and it's symbolism.

The Journey of Pure Antient Masonry, which will include the Holy Royal Arch, will be made more apparent. Topics covered by Orations can be as wide and varied as Freemasonry itself. Open debate and discussion will follow each Oration with Brethren being asked for their observations and comments. Lodges will be actively encouraged to be in contact with the Provincial Grand Orator and his team, through Provincial Grand Lodge Office and to invite one of them to the Lodge.

The current team consists of: VW Bro D G Young, PDPGM (Provincial Grand Orator), W Bro V Thomas, APGM (Asst PGO), and W Bro R Hirst. Provincial Education & Training Officer (Asst PGO). They will be pleased to hear from any Lodge wishing to study / discuss / promote a better understanding of Freemasonry.

W Bro David Pittham OBE PAGDC



W Bro W D (David) Pittham was initiated into St Peters Lodge No 442 in 1971 and was its W o r s h i p f u l Master in 1983. In 1984 he joined the Palmer Lodge

of Provincial Grand Stewards No 8995 and was Worshipful Master in 1996; in 2003 he was promoted to Grand Rank. He was a founder member The Nantahala Lodge No. 9805 consecrated in November 2005 and installed as the third Master in September 2007.

Bro David was a member of various degrees in Freemasonry, a Past 2nd Principal in the Holy Royal Arch and a member of Grand Chapter. He was a member of the Mark Degree, a Royal Ark Mariner, Knights Templar and the Ancient and Accepted Rite. In Royal & Select Masters Degree he was the Deputy District Grand Master of the District Grand Council of the East Midlands Division and had been reappointed to that office just three days before his death.

David was a well respected and much loved Freemason who devoted his life to his family and to the service of others; for many years; he had been particularly involved in raising money for MacMillan Nurses. He also spent many years involved with the Air training Corps reaching the rank of Wing Commander and for which he was awarded the OBE. The attendance at his funeral at the end of May, which filled All Saints Church Peterborough, was testament to his wide popularity in many walks of life and he will be sadly missed by all who knew him.

W Bro Don Harlock PPrSGW

W Bro Don Harlock began his Masonic career as an initiate into Socrates Lodge in 1965 becoming its 144th Master in 1977. He became a founding member Hinchingbrooke Lodge in 1988 and its 2nd Master the following year. Don was uniquely a member of 2 of the 4 Craft Lodges and every other Masonic Order to meet at the Priory and he had been Treasurer, Secretary, Scribe, Recorder et al in most for quite a number of years. Latterly his health precluded attendance at many Lodge and Chapter meetings but he kept going in some until just before the end. He was also a staunch supporter of the Lodge of Installed Master No 3422 in which he served as Master in 2002.

Having grown up and gone to school in Ramsey, Don joined the Royal Marines and , following National Service, he trained at Hendon as a Policeman. After a spell in the Met he was posted to the



Huntingdonshire Constabulary (now Cambridgeshire) where he served as a Beat Officer, Detective, Crime Prevention Officer and latterly Head of CID. After retirement from the police, Don joined Hotpoint as Head of Security and was known to say that it appeared that he had only given up chasing villains to chase missing washing machines.

Don will be missed by his wife Mary and the family and a large circle of Masonic and other friends and acquaintances whose lives he touched over many years. He was a man who was larger than life and he will be rememberd fondly by them all.
