

NEW PROVINCIAL GRAND MASTER INSTALLED

Wicksteed Park at Kettering was the venue for the Installation of our new Provincial Grand Master, RW Bro. Barrie Hall. On this special occasion, the M.W. Pro Grand Master, the Most Honourable the Marquess of Northampton was able to be present to install the new PGM. The Pro Grand Master was returning to his Mother Province as he was initiated into Ceres Lodge No. 6977 in Northampton in 1976.



Over 450 brethren including 20 present and past Provincial Grand Masters and many other distinguished guests attended the Ceremony. In a departure from the usual Masonic protocol, the Past PGM, R.W.Bro. Nicolas Hart attended at the special invitation of the PGM Designate.

The Assistant Provincial Grand Master, W. Bro Derek Young opened Provincial Grand Lodge and the PGM designate was escorted by Masters and Past Masters of Risdene, Pomfret, Socrates, St. Peters, Lodge of Fidelity, Lodge of Perseverance and Lodge of Merit.

The Pro Grand Master then installed R W Bro. Barrie as Provincial Grand Master and urged the Province "not to work him too hard; in that way, he would last for many years to come!".

The Provincial Grand Master then went on to invest W.Bro. Derek Young as Deputy PGM, to reappoint W.Bro. Max Bayes as Assistant PGM and to invest W.Bro. Wayne Williams as Assistant PGM.

In his inaugural Address, the PGM welcomed the Pro Grand Master and all the other guests including 8 Heads of Other Orders. He had inherited from his predecessor a happy Province "in good Hart" and he intended that the Province should be contemporary and proactive in its thinking and practices and vibrant in its love and enjoyment of Masonry. Our policy of "openness" would continue to be an important way of ensuring that we remain part of the wider community. The PGM then went on to say, "we must find better ways of communicating what we stand for and how much we enjoy membership of our Order. This will help us with the development of a more coherent and relevant recruitment strategy. Our Initiates are the lifeblood and basis of Freemasonry".

On Lodge meetings, R.W. Bro. Barrie said, "we should review our traditional style of meetings - not change for the sake of change but we must ensure that we meet the needs of our members especially as their leisure time is limited". Lodge meetings should not always be about Degree ceremonies - learning about our rich heritage through papers, lectures and specialist demonstrations would not only be enjoyable but would help to retain and inform younger members.

He would be reviewing the 3-way communications between the Executive, the Grand Officers and Lodges to see if even better information and feedback could be achieved - this was a vital part of a happy Province.

Key aims for his term of office would be:

- * To enjoy and be happy in our masonry.
- * To care for others
- * To maintain standards in our public and private lives

At the subsequent dinner, in the reply to his toast, the Pro Grand Master gave a very thoughtful address about the directions which he hoped Freemasonry would take in the years to come. He believed that "openness" would help explain ourselves to a sceptical public and show them all the things which are so special about us:

- * We must be relevant to young men today
- We must communicate the moral and social values of our order
- We must practice out of the lodge those things we have been taught in it
- * We should make a daily advancement in the "knowledge of ourselves"

Lord Northampton hoped that brethren would continue to enjoy their Freemasonry and ensure that meetings were pleasant occasions for their visitors by minimising lodge administrative business, by keeping ceremonies to a maximum of 11/2 hours and by circulating Minutes and other papers in advance. He urged brethren to recognise that "old habits would not retain new candidates and members." "Openness will help us to ensure our future".

The Pro Grand Master ended by congratulating the new PGM on his appointment and wished him and the Province well for the future.

Recruitment

In a more structured and contemporary approach to this key area, vital to our long term well-being, I have invited assistant Provincial Grand Masters W. Bro. Max Bayes and Wayne Williams, to find better ways of communicating the aims of Freemasonry and the joys and pleasures of membership to attract future candidates. "White Table" occasions, social Lodge different appropriate to circumstances, and which may include dining, presentations, and a guided Lodge Room tour, would then be enjoyable opportunities to meet possible new members.

Lodge Meetings

I shall also invite Working Parties to review two other aspects of contemporary practice. Firstly to examine our traditional styles of Masonic meeting and to recommend any appropriate changes to bring these more in line with today's life style commitments and constraints. Secondly to review, and where appropriate, to ensure effective three-way communications between the Executive, Group Officers and Lodges - so essential

of Provinces filing into the lodge to witness this important Masonic event. The occasion had the feeling of a coronation.

At the Festive Board the Pro Grand Master spoke about the need to reach out to young men to prevent the alarming decline in our numbers. He spoke of the need to find one's spiritual self in this ever materialistic world that we live in.

Those of us in business know that creation of wealth and building the bottom line is the principal goal and there is little room for sentiment. For me Freemasonry provides that vital counterbalance. Witnessing this great event and listening to the Pro Grand Master confirmed to me

I believe our Lodge meetings should not always be concerned with our traditional Degree ceremonies, important as they are. We are all today's trustees of a great Masonic heritage and learning a little more of that heritage is always an enriching and enjoyable experience,

Presentations of papers, working the Masonic Lectures, demonstrations of key elements of our Degree ceremonies and experiencing historical re-enactments of Degree ceremonies of "yesteryear" are just some of the ways of appreciating our Masonic heritage. Deputy Provincial Grand Master, W. Bro. Derek Young and our Training and Education Officer, W. Bro. Reg Hirst will lead our efforts in developing a portfolio of titles within these various areas and from which Lodges may pro-actively select topics to include in their season's schedule rather than only when a degree ceremony is not possible.

Brethren, Freemasonry is most certainly to be enjoyed and whilst I have outlined some future priorities we should continue to remember our key aim is "to please each other and to unite in the grand design of being happy and communicating happiness". If we can do this and continue to practice the virtues of caring for others and maintaining standards in our public and private lives we shall assuredly continue to be a Province of which we can continue to be very proud.

RECRUITMENT AND RETENTION

Mentoring in the Province of Northamptonshire & Hunts

In September 2004 this Province launched a Mentoring Scheme. The Provincial Executive was prompted into serious action by information brought back from official visits to other Provinces. W.Bro Derek Young learned that in Buckinghamshire and four adjacent Provinces 28% to 30% of Initiates resign within five years and 50% of them do so because of wife/partner/girl-friend pressure, the ladies saying they did not feel part of it and the men saying they did not know enough about Freemasonry to discuss or defend it in a social situation. Also that 90% of the Initiates said the night of Initiation was the best night of their Masonic life but 56% said their Passing to the Second Degree was the worst because they then felt lost, 'as if they had never been there'. Resignations of Masons 4 to 5 years through the Chair was also a concern. I believe that the Mentoring Scheme we have produced provides possible solutions to these problems.

Gloucestershire had produced a Mentoring Scheme and Booklets and after studying them it was recommended that Northamptonshire and Hunts should use the same basic plan but substantially re-write the booklets to meet the needs of our own Province.

A committee was formed consisting of a Master Mason (not through the Chair), a Past Provincial Officer, a junior Past Grand Officer and the Deputy Provincial Grand Master of the time, all from different parts of the Province, ensuring a range of experience and awareness of needs. The interest with which the booklets were received seemed to show that the Committee's work had been well done. Although every Lodge in the Province was issued with three copies of the four-booklet guide to Mentoring demands from Brothers for further sets ran quickly through stocks we had hoped would see us through three trial years. However it has proved possible to issue one further set to each Lodge in September 2005.

Lodges were asked to appoint a Mentoring Co-ordinator and most did so within a few weeks. Meetings of these M.C's were held at which further guidance from the Province and discussion amongst those present provided assistance in the launch of the scheme.

At the time of writing this report (October 2005) Lodges are starting to send in reports of their efforts to implement the scheme in its first year and offering comments on the Scheme and Booklets, which will lead to improvements in 2006. It is too early to make any firm conclusions but indications are that the Scheme has been generally well received. A few Lodges already have it fully in place and many others are in process. Of course a few have done nothing with candidates yet.

Some Lodges have already adapted the way the scheme to suit their own Lodge and others have looked at the problem of members Initiated in the last five to ten years who missed out on the help and information the scheme provides.

Problems have arisen in in some Lodges in finding Mentors with the knowledge and experience necessary who are not already engaged in other demanding work in the Lodge or in Freemasonry generally. Resources of videos, books and leaflets also needs to be more organised. More details of problems and criticisms will no doubt soon emerge and strenuous efforts will be made to meet them.

In asking all Brethren to support us in applying the Mentoring Scheme I have the backing of the Provincial Executive and the Pro Grand Master in his recent speech to the Cornerstone Society (Summer 2005) quoted figures similar to those at the beginning of my report pointing out 'that doing nothing now is not an option'

Valuable Information on Masonic Relief Grants

W Bro Dr Viv Thomas PJGD is Chairman of the Masonic Relief Grants Committee of the Grand Charity.

The Grand Charity is the central grant-making charity for all Freemasons of the English Constitution. One of the three committees which comprise the Grand Charity is the Masonic Relief Grant Committee and I have been fortunate to have been Chairman for the past two years. The Past Provincial Grand Master, RW Bro Nic Hart, assured me, on putting my name forward, that they (The Grand Charity) simply needed a Doctor for some medical advice and that I would need to attend once a quarter for three years. That may have applied to the other two committees, but the then chairman of the Masonic Relief Grants Committee very kindly advised me that I was joining his committee, which, by the way, met monthly, with a tenure of office for nine years!

It is however, an enormous privilege to be able to assist actively and regularly, those who, for any number of reasons, are in desperate need. It is important to recognise that from its title, the Masonic Relief Grants Committee deals entirely with members of the Craft, or their dependents. The non-Masonic grants given for medical research, disaster relief etc, are dealt with by a different committee.

The remit of my committee is far-reaching. Thus, we have provided help to a widow whose husband died 60 years ago and will continue to do so as long as there is a financial need, hi order to assist as many cases as possible, we work on a budget of approximately £2.8 million. If we acknowledge the statistics, which shows a decline in membership to below 300,000 and with our present level of annual contribution to the Grand Charity of £7.50, it is not too difficult to recognise that the Masonic Relief Grant Committee alone will account for more than the whole income per year.

From September 2004 to August 2005, we were able to assist 1,992 cases, with a total cost of £2, 848,652. This spending would have covered financial aid for normal daily living, funeral expenses, provision of wheel chairs or other mobility aids. Our Province has been well represented, in that our Provincial Almoner, W Bro John Partridge, has ensured that Northamptonshire & Hunts remains well within the Top Ten of the most active Provinces in the claims submitted and actioned.

We are also able to cross refer to the other main charities. If we received an application for financial support where there may also be an indication for a medical input, we can ask the New Masonic Samaritan Fund to consider the case. Similarly, if a Mason, unable to work, needs assistance, there may also be further help for his children from the Royal Masonic Trust for Girls and Boys. All of this, of course, cannot happen without a considerable input from the "backroom" staff at the Grand Charity. Each month, I receive a compiled book of 150-200+ applications, which each member of the Committee will peruse for a few days, to arrive at an appropriate sum to be dispensed. The totals to be awarded are agreed at Committee in the morning meeting and I am able to sign the cheques for distribution in the afternoon. There is a great deal of satisfaction to be enjoyed in signing cheques for approximately £200,000, knowing the good those cheques will do and that that money has come from us all.

In essence, Brethren, the Grand Charity is YOUR charity, and, by bringing needy cases to the attention of your Almoner, we can continue to help the poor and distressed.

CHARITY CREDIT CARDS

We are always trying to find new ways to raise funds for our Masonic Charities but, one option used by many charities, is to offer Please return either to your Lodge Secretary or directly to the an "affinity" credit card for our members. The usual arrangement is Provincial Office at Freemason's Hall, St. George's Avenue, for the credit card provider to pay a proportion of the spending on Northampton. NN2 6JA. each card back to the charity which provides the card. The percentage payback is typically 0.25% and, as this is technically a royalty, the charity cannot reclaim the tax through the Gift Aid Scheme.

As an alternative, some banks and building societies offer a credit card which pays a "Cashback" of 1% to the cardholder which can be voluntarily donated to a charity using Gift Aid. If only half of all Freemasons were to use such a card and, on average, spent £250 per month on their cards, after recovering the tax, this could generate an income of over £6 million each year. Clearly such a possibility is worth investigating and the attached questionnaire will help to assess whether use of a Cashback Card would be worthwhile.

The Card would be applied for in the usual way and any balances from your existing cards could be transferred to the new card. The cardholder would be asked to sign a declaration that he is a UK taxpayer and that he wishes the chosen charity to reclaim the tax on his gift.

If the Province responds supportively, it is possible that Northamptonshire and Huntingdonshire could be used as a trial area. To assess the potential support, it would be helpful if you could complete the questionnaire and return it either to your Lodge Secretary or directly to the Provincial Office. Please help us to help the charities by completing the form - we need as comprehensive a response as possible.

MORE MASONIC MISCELLANY

Visiting Nova Scotian Lodges

by W. Bro. Andrew Ward Thomas Deacon Lodge No 9126

I first visited Nova Scotia in the autumn of 2000, and have been back on many occasions. The Freemason's Hall in Nova Scotia is in the main street of Halifax, and I made due enquiries with my Lodge Secretary on my return as to whether this was an approved lodge to visit before my next trip.

Subsequently I have visited three of the lodges there. Two of the lodges use Emulation ritual and, except for retaining the traditional penalty in the obligation, their ceremonies are similar to our own whilst the others use York Rite as adapted by the Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia.

Meetings generally start around 7pm and finish around 10pm. There is no formal dinner, but a supper is provided for brethren requiring something to eat. The Lodge is generally "called-off and "called-on" several during the evening, which gives the brethren chance to chat amongst themselves whilst the candidate is being prepared. St Andrew's Lodge No. 1, is the oldest lodge in North America, and dates its warrant to the year after Halifax was founded in 1750. Being also the oldest lodge in the British Commonwealth, the Master, Wardens and brethren of St. Andrews have various privileges. The Master has the honour of carrying the Book of Constitution in all Masonic processions when the Grand Master of Nova Scotia or his Deputy are present. The Officers of the lodge are entitled to wear gold chain collars. The brethren are entitled to wear aprons trimmed with Grand Lodge blue and two stripes of gold braid to signify their bicentenary status.

It is interesting to note that in the Canadian Lodges, mentoring has been a way of life for sometime. Lodges generally open in the third degree and work down to lower degrees as and when required, as such, Fellowcraft and entered apprentices have little to do in

the lodges. A Past Master is generally appointed to leave the lodge with the junior brethren to instruct and teach them whilst excluded from the temple. In addition, each brother will have a guide or mentor who is not necessarily their proposer or seconder. This person will be the one who leads the candidate around the lodge in the ceremonies. (In most cases more than one candidate will be present at each of the ceremonies, and all will be blindfold.)

Retirement of Two Long-standing Palmer Court Stalwarts


