Summer Reflections of the Provincial Grand Master

At last the BBQ summer we've all been promised! I do hope you and your families have enjoyed a relaxing summer break notwithstanding our dashed hopes of World Cup and Wimbledon success!

Our May meetings of Provincial Grand Lodge and Three Counties concluded a most enjoyable and successful year's Masonry. Enjoyable it most certainly was as evidenced by the many Lodge visit reports I received which reflected on the quite tangible atmosphere of happiness and enjoyment in which our Lodge meetings continue to be held throughout the Province.

Successful I also believe the year has been both in terms of membership statistics, which continue to remain very stable even in these difficult economic times, and in our tremendous fund raising work for the [2013 Festival Appeal](#) on behalf of the [Royal Masonic Benevolent Institution](#) and for so very many local charities and good causes. We have now well exceeded £1.4m towards our £1.6m Festival target with nearly 50% of Lodges having already exceeded 75% of their individual targets. With every Lodge striving to maximise Regular Payment Promises (RPPs) as well as organising many enjoyable fund raising events, I am confident that we shall not only meet our Festival target but achieve a final total of which we can all be very proud.

May I also congratulate all the Lodges and Brethren who contributed to the Provincial Haiti Disaster Appeal. We forwarded no less than £15k to the Grand Charity's national Relief Chest for the disaster – a simply amazing effort – and we now await Grand Charity's views on how best to use a total funding of nearly £100k to help the families and children of that devastated island.

During the latter part of our Masonic year we also enjoyed a number of memorable occasions. Centenary celebrations by the Installed Masters Lodge included a superb presentation by VW Bro John Hamill, UGLE Special Projects Director, reflecting on the history and development of Freemasonry over the last century. Included in John's reflections was his encouragement to be mindful, in this modern age, of the needs and constraints of today's busy family and working lives and to adjust Lodge practices to ensure – without ever losing sight of our traditional landmarks – that our Masonry fits easily with those modern lifestyles. It could have been a brief for our [Salcey Forest Lodge which we consecrated on another memorable occasion in March](#) and whose progress we shall follow with great interest and pride.

A little earlier in the year – indeed on a cold and snowy January evening – the Richard Sandbach Lodge of Research staged the Annual Richard Sandbach Lecture. Our distinguished speaker was none other than the [Grand Secretary, VW Bro Nigel Brown](#). In a totally absorbing presentation Nigel reflected on his personal and very optimistic view of the future of Freemasonry. Ever since I have found it invaluable to “benchmark” that view and its component factors against our own situation in Northamptonshire and Huntingdonshire.

First among these factors is the importance of effective recruitment of new members – “no Lodge can thrive without its Initiates, they are the lifeblood and basis of Masonry” – and to ensure that potential members are able to clearly demonstrate that their reasons are serious, properly based and of a likely long term nature.

The issues of what a prospective new member expects of Freemasonry and what we expect of him are of paramount importance and must be clearly and fully understood by both parties. I believe our recruitment procedures, both traditional and our new “White Table” approach, are increasingly orientated towards this strategy and I commend their adoption to every Lodge.

A second key factor in ensuring a thriving Masonic Order is to maintain and develop a strong involvement in the work of our local communities. [Teddies for Loving Care \(TLC\)](#) and our [Masonic Trout and Salmon Fishing \(MTSF\)](#) work for disabled youngsters are wonderful examples of Freemasonry in the community and charities in which this Province is playing a very active and successful role. Freemasonry continues to be a tremendous force for good in the community as evidenced by all our charity work. It is so important to build on this work with more community projects, Provincial and local, embodying that caring time and effort which is such an integral part of our Freemasonry.



Allied to our work within the community, let us always maintain a great pride in our Masonic membership. Always be happy to discuss Freemasonry with family, friends and colleagues, always reflect that we are an organisation seeking to make “good men better men” in this increasingly turbulent world and always be proud of our efforts to attain the highest standards in all our endeavours.

And finally, but so importantly, our future is certainly assured if we continue to enjoy our Masonry whether through the challenges of self improvement or through our work in helping others in distress or through the life long friendships we all forge in this very special fraternity.

I too am very optimistic about the future of Freemasonry and especially about the future of this happy and exceptional Province of Northamptonshire and Huntingdonshire which I have the privilege to serve.

Masonic Help on Olympic Hopeful's Road to Rio

A pupil of Jack Hunt School in Peterborough who is studying for his A levels has received Masonic help on his road to the Olympics.

Masons came to hear of James Fox's rowing exploits through his mother, Claire, who has worked at the Ellindon (Peterborough) Masonic Centre as a waitress for the last two years.

James, is a junior rower and Captain of the Quadruple Scull team and part of the Great Britain Rowing team that, in August 2009, won the overall Coupe de la Jeunesse Trophy (Junior Rowing Championship) in Vichy, France. Claire is proud of the fact that James was selected as Captain as other team members were from Eton and Westminster Schools.

Initially, James had been short of funds. For example, a boat costs £6,000 and oars or blades cost £350 a Association of Friends of Devonshire Courtheard that James was, so to speak, up the creek without a paddle and raised £400 which was presented to Claire. This enabled James to compete at Munich where he won the doubles by five lengths, making him the Junior Champion in that event.

He hopes to go to Brunell University, which will enable him to continue rowing and is shortlisted for the 2016 Olympic team as a senior (he is too young to be selected for the 2012 Olympic Games).

The 2016 Olympic Games are to be held in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil. The journey for James will be hard and expensive. James (and his mother) would welcome any other Masonic assistance on his long **road to Rio**.

Survey Results Help in Compiling Book on 300 Years of Masonry

In 2017 Freemasonry in England and Wales will be 300 years old. As a part of the celebrations surrounding this historic event the UGLE is to publish a history of this 300 years. This will particularly demonstrate the important role Freemasons have played in the civil, cultural and social development of our nation. This led to Phase One of the UGLE inspired Historical Resources Survey in which Lodges and Chapters were asked to send to UGLE information about the records they hold. The MW The Pro Grand Master Peter Lowndes joined the representatives of more than 35 Provinces to celebrate the success of the first phase of the Survey at a reception at Freemasons' Hall in London in May. Over 6,000 Lodges and Chapters completed the survey which recorded more than 117,000 documents and shows the depth of material available within Lodges and Chapters.

He noted, "Lodges and Chapters reflect the variety of local influences, personalities and local circumstances on Freemasonry over time. Local diversity one of the strengths of English Freemasonry that enables us to look forward to celebrating a three hundredth birthday in 2017. It is important that when we look at the history of freemasonry we look at the local history as well as the history of "Head Office."

In this Province, 31% of Lodges and Chapters have so far completed the survey and returned it to UGLE. The Provincial Grand Master, RW Bro Barrie Hall said, "I would like to thanks all those in the Province who have been involved in the planning and organisation of this important Project and especially those Lodges who have now completed the Survey. It is not too late to add further information from our Province. I urge all Lodges yet to make an input, particularly the older Lodges who have a wealth of history behind them, to complete the survey. W Bro Gerry Crawford is acting as overall Project Coordinator and would be pleased to offer support and advice to Lodge Secretaries or representatives on any aspect of the survey."

A reward for Lodges and Chapters that have completed the Survey is the opportunity to apply for a UGLE grant towards the preservation and conservation of their historic records. Applications should be made on forms available through the Provincial Office and must be received at UGLE by 30 October 2010.

An incidental part of this project has been to highlight the way in which Lodges and Chapters archive and preserve their records. The UGLE has taken [advice on this from specialists of the British Library](#) and provided [information to help Secretaries](#) in this process.

Mark Benevolent Fund 142nd Anniversary Festival

Seldom can there have been a better attended Masonic event in the Province than when the Mark Province of Northamptonshire and Huntingdonshire hosted the Annual Festival on Saturday 17 July 2010. Over 700 Mark Master Masons and partners, with [Right Worshipful Brother George Edward Bonham Provincial Grand Master](#) presiding, attended the Festival at the [East of England Showground, Peterborough](#).

The Mark Benevolent fund was established in 1868 by the Most Worshipful Grand Master the Reverend George R Portal, with his own Latin tag “Bis dat qui cito dat” – he gives twice who gives promptly, which became the principal guideline of the Fund.

The Grand Lodge of Mark Master Masons was represented by the Pro Grand Master, MW Bro John Hale, the Deputy Grand Master, RW Bro Benjamin Addy, Assistant Grand Master, RW Bro Michael E Herbert, President of the General Board, RW Bro Peter H Rollin who is also President of the Mark Benevolent Fund, and the Grand Secretary, RW Bro John Brackley.

W Bro Viv Thomas PSGD APMG Discusses Masonic Education

Disraeli once said "Upon the education of the people of this country, the fate of this country depends". When the Editor asked me to write a few words on "Education", I thought that here is one article that will be skipped over very rapidly! John Dryden, the poet, said "by education, most have been misled".

There one can see quite opposing views on the importance placed upon education, which is defined as the act or process of educating or being educated; systematic instruction. Upon that definition, the average member of our wonderful institution may well say that it doesn't apply to us. We have all that we need in our ritual, we go out for the evening, Fred was raised brilliantly, we had an excellent meal and the raffle produced £150.

It has been said that there are two levels of education in Masonry. At the most superficial level is the scenario outlined above; with which none of us has any qualms. It allows for an evening of comradeship, fraternity and charity, enviable sources of enjoyment in any society.

Then there is a considerably deeper level. I recently read a paper entitled "An esoteric retrospective of the Exaltation Ceremony", which very clearly attempts to relate the Holy Royal Arch to the Kabbalah. This, certainly, would not be everyone's cup of tea! However, between these two levels of activity, there remains a large number of Masons who would welcome more knowledge of the wonderfully rich tapestry that is our Craft. This can be achieved in a number of ways.

Traditionally, if a Lodge has no Candidate and a Lecture has been organised, a large percentage of the members will say "Oh, it's only a Lecture" and not bother to attend. Sadly, that would be an opportunity lost for a daily advancement but also it would present something of a discourtesy to the lecturer, who would have spent much time in his preparation. Of course, it is incumbent on any lecturer to ensure his presentation is not only of interest, but also to engage those present in some form of discussion, so that views other than his own can be aired.



We can also educate by means of a display and that is what our excellent Demonstration Team do, displaying the history and development of how what we have now came into being. And I hope we all support our Lodges of Instruction. These are meant not for simply rehearsing the next Ceremony, but should be the means whereby we can learn more of why we do what sometimes may seem strange to us. EA's and Past Masters alike can all find something they didn't know before. If we simply take for granted our ancient ritual, it may become stale and uninteresting, but if we explore the background, the meanings and interpretations, then what we have becomes alive, stimulating and always new.

All this can be achieved through "Education". I do hope you will face the challenge to learn a little more of the amazing and fascinating history that has been passed to us, so that we may hand that gift on, enthusiastically, to those who follow us.

PAGSoj. He is also a senior member of the Ancient and Accepted Rite and holds Great Priory rank in the Knights Templar Order.

Throughout his sixty years in the Craft and long service in many other Orders, W Bro Bill served with great distinction and commitment. Following the Jubilee Certificate presentation the Brethren gave a standing ovation in tribute to W Bro Bill’s Masonic service.

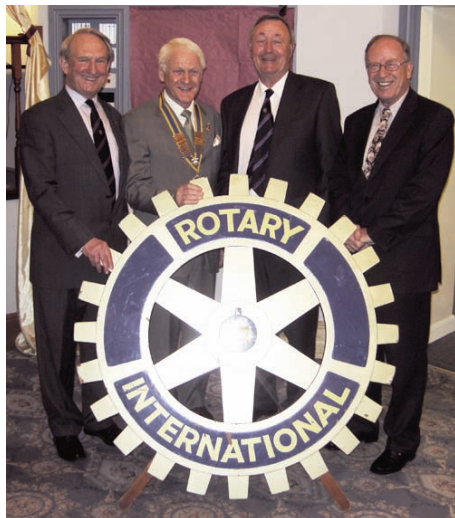

In the [Summer 2008 edition of Password](#) we invited you views on Masonic matters in the form of Letters to the Editor. They are still most welcome. Here is the latest.

The Usage and Abusage of the Masonic Gavel

Dear Editor

As a firm supporter of many years standing of the formality and etiquette traditionally associated with Masonic protocol, I have become increasingly concerned at the methods of conducting our proceedings, especially in the management of the Festive Board, and I would like to express my opinions through the pages of Password.

There are many who believe that our after-proceedings are quite separate from our meetings. Unfortunately those brethren appear unaware of our history. Before Freemason's Lodges became owners of property, meetings were usually held in rooms above or within licensed premises, in rooms would hired for the evening. Meetings lasted many hours. At suitable intervals the Lodge would be "called off" and refreshments would be served. The Lodge would then be "called on" again and business resumed.

The Master was in charge of proceedings. It was only after the acquisition or construction of purpose-built premises that the meeting was separated from the festive

board. However, our festive boards should still be conducted with attention being paid to the etiquette which obtains within the Lodge. This is especially so with reference to the dignity and respect which should be accorded to the Worshipful Master. Bad manners have no place at our table, and care should be taken not to overstep the mark between an acceptable level of light-heartedness and rudeness.

In some Lodges the Director of Ceremonies controls the Festive Board but also usurps the authority of the Master, both in how, when and with whom wine is taken, and also in the random use of the Master's gavel. Gavels are given for use only by the Master and his Wardens. A gavel is not given to the DC, ADC or Tyler.

The power of the Brethren to elect the Worshipful Master does not allow them to withdraw the power. The Master should retain possession of the gavel and never let it go beyond his reach, whether in Lodge or at refreshment.

The Master should not use his gavel unnecessarily, nor too loudly, but rather gently or sparingly. The dignity of his high office is not well served by over-zealous use of the gavel.

The gavel is the Master's emblem of power and authority. It should, therefore, remain with him throughout the entire proceedings. The attention which the Master receives after sounding the gavel should not depend on the level of noise he makes. The Brethren should immediately be silent out of respect for the Master. The Master who uses his gavel too forcibly is likely to lose the respect of both members and visiting Brethren.

There is an increasing trend for DC's to take over both the gavel and the control of

proceedings. It seems to be a practice for some DCs not just to have a gavel but to have the Master's gavel which is quite wrong. The DC should ascertain from the Master the names of those with whom he would like to take wine and not dictate to him who those persons should be. The DC should sit close enough to the Master to be able to see when it is appropriate for the Master to take wines. It is bad manners for the DC to bang a gavel, especially if the Master is in conversation at the time. When there is an appropriate lull in proceedings, he should politely request the Master to gavel. The DC should then rise and announce the wine taking(s).

With respect to the toast list, it is pointless for the DC to gavel, then ask the Brethren to pay attention to the WVM. The sound of the Master's gavel should be sufficient to silence the Brethren.

Masters are not always well-enough informed about these matters. Perhaps those approaching the Chair should take more time to learn the true nature and limit of their responsibilities and what is expected of them and not take as gospel the well-meaning but sometimes ill-directed ideas of Directors of Ceremonies.

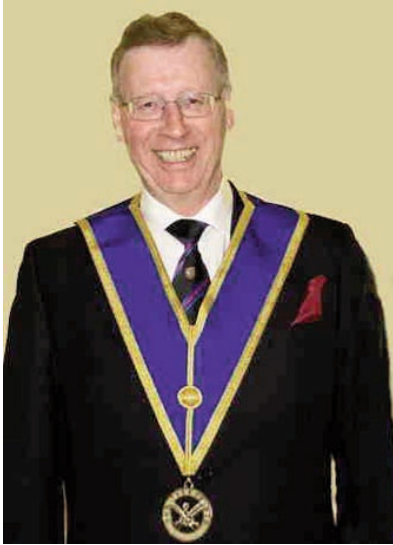

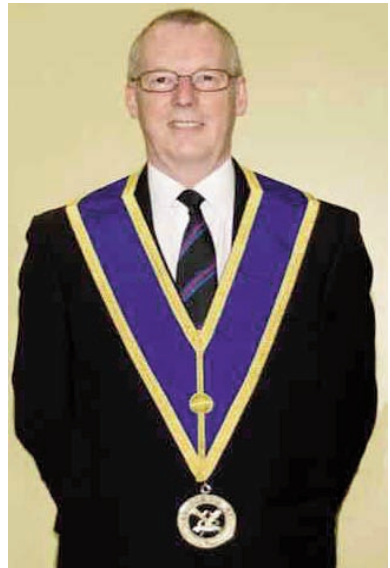
