LAUNCH OF THE 2013 FESTIVAL

Friday 23rd March saw the fruition of twelve months planning, when the Launch Dinner was hosted by the Chairman, Very Worshipful Brother Derek Young in the presence of the President of the RMBI, Very Worshipful Brother John Moore, together with the Festival President, Right Worshipful Brother W Barrie Hall.

Provincial Grand Master was proposed by the Festival Chairman, and in his response the Provincial Grand Master announced that he had agreed with Grand Lodge that our Province would undertake to raise the sum of £1,600,000 for the Royal Masonic Benevolent Institution during the course of the Festival, which will run for six years and

culminate in a major celebratory event in the spring of 2013.

During this Festival our Provincial Grand Master has also agreed to transfer funds to the RMBI on a regular basis throughout

At the function, every Lodge in the Province was represented, and it was a truly magnificent sight to see the Ballroom so well arranged for the dinner. Some 212 brethren were present including 45 Grand Officers together with 34 Officers of Provincial Grand Lodge.

PROVINCIAL NEWS FROM THE PGM

A Good Year for the Three R's, or indeed, the Four R's in our Masonry

In writing this a few short weeks after a very happy meeting of Provincial Grand Lodge in May, I am well aware that we have come to the end of a particularly busy and memorable year in the life of this fine Province. The old adage that time flies when you are enjoying yourself has never been truer. A year of significant progress in the 3R's of Masonry - **Recruitment, Retention and Retrieval** - has, I believe, been enjoyed throughout the Province. Our **fourth R - Relief** - has also made major progress.

Lodges are to be congratulated on an outstanding **recruitment** record which has led to a further - albeit modest - increase in members during the year. Undoubtedly our improved recruitment procedures - most especially the development, by APGM W Bro Wayne Williams, of a structured yet flexible "White Table" format by which Lodges may introduce friends to the world of freemasonry in a relaxed and knowledgeable manner - have contributed to our continued success in this area. I commend the approach to any of our Lodges experiencing recruitment difficulties. In parallel the Province increased to eighty nine Lodges with the Consecration of Wilavestone Lodge - a Lodge based on strong ties with the village of Wollaston in East Northamptonshire. It was, as with previous Consecrations, an immensely happy and wonderfully attended occasion.

Improvements in our ability to **retain** Lodge membership continue to be secured through the adoption of Mentoring Programmes providing our younger Brethren with greater understanding, involvement in, and enjoyment of their Masonic activities. Let me again urge all our Lodges to build on their Mentoring experience to date and ensure that our newly Initiated Brethren are, to mutual benefit, successfully and happily integrated into the life and work of their Lodge.

"Making a daily advancement in Masonic knowledge" is likewise a key factor in membership retention. I have been delighted to see an increasing number of Lodges actively building into their monthly programmes appropriate lectures, demonstrations, re-enactments etc to explore and enjoy our wonderfully rich Masonic heritage. Their success and appreciation by the Brethren has been very apparent and we shall, under the leadership of DPGM VVV Bro Derek Young, be building on this aspect of our meetings in the coming year.

Our third "R" - **Retrieval** - is equally important in maintaining a happy Lodge. Ensuring that we understand the reasons underlying any Brother's regular absence from Lodge is, as every Almoner is aware, very challenging work, but it is only by so doing that we are then able to try and resolve the problem(s) and assist the Brother to once again enjoy his Freemasonry to the full. I urge every Brother to make regular contact with his Lodge Almoner - who does a fantastic job - and volunteer your precious time and effort to help him in all his work.

As with our efforts to ensure continued proficiency in the "3R's" we have enjoyed a number of major developments in our fourth R - **Relief** or Charity - most especially with the launch of our 2013 Festival Appeal in support of the Royal Masonic Benevolent Institution (RMBI). Attended by representatives from all the Lodges in the Province, the March 23rd Launch Dinner proved a most enjoyable occasion with a fine address by Past PresidentVW Bro John

Moore providing a great insight into the work and ethos of a very special Masonic Charity. Provincial and Lodge financial targets were also unveiled - all of which I am quite sure will be met and indeed well exceeded. During dinner we also presented an initial cheque for £20,000 to mark the beginning of this immensely important Festival Appeal.

Our January "Big Band" Concert, the May race meeting at Huntingdon and W Bro Max Bayes' unbelievably successful "Walk the Province" project which raised no less than an amazing £131,000 over a warm and sunny Easter Weekend, have all made for a tremendous start to our Festival fund raising - much to the delight of Provincial Charity Steward, W Bro lain Lauder. Do please keep the smile on W Bro lain's face by ensuring your wholehearted commitment and support to Lodge and Provincial fund raising events together with your personal commitment to regular contributions through the Gift Aided Regular Payment Promise (RPP) system. Your Lodge Charity Steward will be only too happy to assist you in any way possible.

W Bro Max Bayes has now taken over the Chair of the Festival Appeal Sub-Committee who are already in the early stages of planning a number of very enjoyable Provincial fund raising events for the coming years. I know that the Committee will be able to count on the support of every Lodge in ensuring the success of these special events and occasions.

In parallel with Festival Appeal fund raising activities may I again encourage all Lodges to reexamine their strategy for allocating their hard earned income. Firstly to secure the Lodge's financial stability and thereby avoid any major or regular raising of member subscriptions. Secondly to ensure an annual Lodge donation to Provincial Grand Charity funds - so important in providing support to petitioners within the Province. And thirdly to resolve to work with other Lodges in your area to identify and agree local needy charities and good causes. If each Lodge can then make an appropriate contribution to the selected charities/good causes and then collectively request Provincial Grand Charity to match or exceed the combined contributions, then a truly major grant could be facilitated. Indeed a number of examples based on this excellent approach are now being reported in Password on a regular basis.

Brethren, our summer break is now well underway. Do please make it a very relaxing summer with family and friends and re-charge your batteries for another busy but very enjoyable Masonic year ahead. Indeed when we come to our new season determined to continue to enjoy your Masonry, seek to achieve high standards in all your endeavours - Masonic and non-Masonic, and above all, continue to practice those three great principles of Brotherly Love, Relief and Truth in their fullest light. In so doing we can ensure that this fine Province of Northamptonshire and Huntingdonshire continues to remain a very happy Province for us all.

During his address the Provincial Grand Master was able to present a cheque for £20,000 to Very Worshipful Brother John Moore as the first step on the road ahead. Towards the end of the evening the Launch packs were distributed to the Lodge Charity Stewards, which contained the targets for each Lodge including the as then, unconsecrated Wilaveston Lodge number 9829.

A new Stewards jewel is already available and may be purchased by any Brother who has contributed a minimum figure of £100 to the Appeal. The jewels are priced at £15, and are available from W Bro Iain Lauder upon the submission of the relevant certificate by the Lodge Charity Steward.

An innovation for our Province with this Festival is that we have designed and are offering for sale a range of Festival Merchandise. We currently offer four products namely Cuff Links, Ladies Silk Scarves, together with Braces and Napkins. It is possible that during the course of the Festival other products will be introduced, and already our "Provincial Senior Grand Merchandiser", Francis Margôt is in negotiations with a number of manufacturers. A number of Provinces have designed products to augment Festival funding, and in the pre-launch period lain Lauder was able to visit and meet his opposite numbers in Warwickshire and Nottinghamshire who offered much help and advice, and continue to keep in close contact.

Yet another slight change is with Lodges who obtain Grand Patron status, which is by donating from their own funds the sum of £2400, a level set by RMBI. As well as the Executive presenting a certificate endorsed by the Charity, it is proposed to also present a pair of Alms bags, to mark the achievement suitably embroidered with the Festival logo. The feed back from the Launch evening and numerous calls since, leads the team to think that exciting times lie ahead for our Province, but reliant of course on the energy and drive of the splendid group of Charity Stewards upon whose shoulders the task rests.

Wilavestone Lodge Consecration

On 30th April, the Wilavestone Lodge was consecrated in a special meeting at Freemasons' Hall, Northampton, presided over by the Provincial Grand Master, RW.Bro Barrie Hall. Over 160 Masons from across the Province and the rest of the country attended the event.

The Lodge was opened by W Bro Wayne Williams AsstPGM, and on his arrival, R.W Bro Barrie Hall PGM took the gavel and the chair in order to act Consecrating Officer. The Provincial Grand Secretary, W Bro Norman Pope read out the Warrant, and the 27 Brethren Petitioning present unanimously gave their approval of the Officers named. The Provincial Grand Master consecrated the new

Lodge according to ancient custom, assisted by the Provincial Grand Chaplain, W Bro Tony Avery, and the other members of the consecrating team.

The Lodge being formed, VW Bro Derek Young DepPGM took the chair and installed W Bro Max Bayes AsstPGM into the Chair of King Solomon. The first Master then invested his Wardens, W Bro John Rivett and W Bro John Lee-Thompson, and the rest of the first officers of the Lodge who took their places in the Temple.

The Worshipful Master conducted the first business of the Wilavestone Lodge. Notices of motion were given for the proposal of two initiates and two joining members, to be balloted for at the first regular meeting in September, giving the Lodge an excellent initial membership and further basis for growth. The Lodge was closed in due form and afterwards, the Brethren present dined in harmony at the Festive Board. During the reply to his toast, W Bro Max Bayes commented on the number of old Wollaston families who were represented amongst the



Founders and present at the Consecration. The Wilavestone Lodge became the 89th in the Province, and the latest of the special interest lodges, with membership being restricted to those with a strong connection to the village of Wollaston. Any candidate for membership must either be a resident, or have been born, lived, educated or employed in the village, or have a strong family connection.

EASTERTIDE CHARITY WALK RAISES OVER £130,000

Following the launch of the Festival, it has received its first big boost, from the Charity Walk, led by W Bro Max Bayes, the Assistant Provincial Grand Master. It started on Good Friday 6th April, from the Province's most northerly Masonic Hall in Stamford, Lincolnshire, and culminated on Easter Monday 9th April, at it's most southerly in Brackley, Northamptonshire, a total of 70 miles.

The walk was led off by the Provincial Grand Master, RW Bro Barrie Hall, who joined the walk



each day for one of its sections and he was there at the end to see W Bro Max Bayes bring it home. Each day of the walk was split into three sections and Brethren were invited to raise sponsorship and join W Bro Max Bayes for one or more of the sections.



Well over 150 members from the Province participated, some raising as much as £1,000 in sponsorship. Over the four days eleven Brethren and one Lady accompanied W Bro Max by completing the 70 miles.

The walk was the inspiration of W Bro Max who used it, not only to give a great start to the new Festival, but to bring to all Province members attention the important and vital work of the RMBI, as well as gaining recognition that their continued support is beneficial to all those requiring its help.

W Bro Beresiner kindly agreed and arrived at St George's Avenue just before the start of the meeting at which he was warmly welcomed by RW Bro Barrie Hall, the Master of the Lodge.



At the appointed time Bro Yasha delivered a most interesting talk on the subject of attacks on Freemasonry noting that, despite the perception that they were a relatively recent phenomena, there was nothing new in them at all. He pointed out that over the years attacks had come from social, religious and political quarters since the first known incident in 1696 (well before the founding of the first "Grand Lodge" in 1717). This took the form of a 300 word leaflet addressed to Londoners. The first and most significant religious attack was the Papal Bull of Pope Clement XII issued on 28th April 1738. Subsequent attacks have ranged from tabling a debate at the General Synod of the Church of England, through the large majority vote against Freemasonry at the Methodist Conference in 1985 to ongoing significant hostility by the Southern Baptists in the USA.

Bro Yasha pointed out that free government and Freemasonry easily co-exist and, whilst there had been (unfounded) accusations of plots against governments being debated in Lodges, such as the 19th Century Latin American rebellion against Spain, they were invariably causes that Masons, in their private capacity, had simply supported rather than instigated. Another oft quoted example of Masonic interference in politics was that of the infamous P2 Lodge in the downfall of the Italian Government in 1981 but, that Lodge had in fact been disowned by the Grand Orient of Italy some five years earlier. Bro Yasha ended by saying that despite various attempts to discredit Freemasonry there were generally no "political" constraints other than the continuing insistence on the Judiciary, Police and Councillors being compelled to declare their membership; in any event, as we well know, political involvement by Masonic organisations is strictly forbidden these days. Following hearty acclamation from the Brethren present the WM thanked Bro Yasha most sincerely for making such an effort to attend the meeting and for presenting such a captivating talk at such short notice.

An Honour For The Stamford Masonic Centre

At the Annual Stamford Past Mayors' Guild Dinner at the Stamford Masonic Centre Lady Victoria and Mr Simon Leatham of Burghley House were guests of honour. This event was a special one because the Past Mayors Guild Trophy was unveiled by Lady Victoria who advised that the base was made from an oak, planted by Capability Brown in Burghley Park. It was a wonderful evening, complimented by a super dinner prepared by Bro Andy Binder.

After dinner, W Bro Cedric Cadman, PPrGStwd, the Mayor of Stamford in the year 1999/2000, invited Lady Victoria and Simon Leatham to visit the Lodge room, which they found most interesting.

Installation of New District Grand Master

The Grand Master of the Grand Council of Royal & Select Masters, M III Companion J Alan Wright was present on Saturday 12th

May for the Installation of the new District Grand Master for the East III. Midlands, R Comp Michael B Jolley. The Installation took place in the morning at Corby Masonic Centre followed by lunch with the Annual District

meeting being held in the afternoon.

During the Installation Ceremony, the Grand Master especially impressed upon the new District Grand Master the importance of maintaining and developing a close bond between the Order and its parent bodies in both Craft and Royal Arch Masonry. This was particularly relevant following recognition of the Order by His Royal Highness the Duke of Kent, Grand Master of the Craft, in his Annual Address on 25 April 2007.

There were many visitors from other

Districts including some 8 District Grand Masters together with the team of Officers from the Grand Council of Royal and Select

Masters.

R III Comp Jolley appointed III Comp W David Pittham OBE as Deputy District Grand Master and III Comp David Jackson as District Grand Principal Conductor of the Work.

In his inaugural Address, the new District Grand Master paid a special tribute to his predecessor, R III Comp. Our Past Provincial Grand Master was Presented with his Certificate and the Pro Grand Master paid tribute to his 50 years in





Donald Frederick White PSGD, PAsstPGM

As the PGM, RW Bro Barrie Hall. noted at the memorial service held on Friday 4th May at Earls Barton Church "To reflect that Don White was a larger than life character would be to be guilty of gross understatement"; he was simply an immense presence



in all he did particularly his Rugby and his Masonry.

Don was Master of his Mother Lodge, England's Centre, in 1979, and a founder of Cumton Lodge based at Castle Ashby. However, Don's twin passions of Masonry and Rugby really came together when Webb Ellis Lodge, the first ever Rugby Masonic Lodge, was founded in 2001 enabling many of Don's East Midlands Rugby friends to sustain and extend the fellowship enjoyed within the game of Rugby football through Freemasonry; it was fitting that Don became the first Master of this fine Lodge. He was a member of many other Lodges in the Province, and his commitment and contribution to Masonry culminated in his appointment to Grand Rank in 1988 and to the post of APGM in 1994 - a position which Don enjoyed to the full as he undertook his many official visits to Lodges throughout the Province, meeting old friends and always of course making many new friends.

Throughout his Masonic career both as a member of his various Lodges and as APGM, Don's work epitomised the three Great Principles of Freemasonry Brotherly Love, Relief and Truth. People always came first with Don - he had time for everyone. He was truly "exemplary in conduct, courteous in manners, easy of address and steady and firm in principle".

Don also turned his considerable business talents to good effect in all matters charitable - always very close to a Freemason's heart. He was a most persuasive champion of local good causes and charities, an outstanding example being his support for the local Scout Appeal for funds to create the Sir John Lowther Scout Training and Activity Centre at

Kettering, when he persuaded our Grand Master - the Duke of Kent - to helicopter in to Wickstead Park to attend a fund raising dinner - Don played a key role in raising over a £1m towards that very worthy cause.

He exercised those same talents when he became a Director and later Chairman of the Northampton Masonic Hall Company in St George's Avenue. Once again his enthusiasm, driving energy and leadership secured funds for many, many key projects to enhance the facilities at that fine Centre - facilities greatly appreciated by our members and the many other local organisations who also enjoy their special occasions at St. George's Avenue.

The Freemasons of Northamptonshire & Huntingdonshire will always remember Don White with the highest regard and respect, with love and deep affection. We were all so fortunate to have enjoyed the pleasure of his company and we are all the richer for having known him.

Her son, W Bro David Waddy, entertained his mother at the Ceres Lodge Ladies' Festival in 2002, when she was 96 years old (just 50 years after her late husband, W Bro Frank Waddy had been Master of the Lodge). She was similarly entertained at a Ceres Sunday Lunch in 2005 when she was 99 years old and at a Buckby Castle Lodge Sunday Lunch in 2006 when she was 100 years old; she will be sadly missed.

A new slant on Ladies' Festivals by W Bro John Cousin

Ladies' Festivals are an important part of the Masonic calendar when, the time after the festive board can be particularly rewarding in helping young Masons and their Ladies' to meet with others in a relaxed atmosphere. It also provides an opportunity to socialise with non-Masonic gentlemen who might be considering Freemasonry.

Nearing the end of my year as Worshipful Master of Thistle and Rose Lodge at Corby, at one such Ladies' Night my wife and I commented on the number of Brethren and their Ladies' who had 'sat out' every dance. My daughter's partner, a 'young' Mason, stated that, like him, they were probably unable to dance. When my wife offered to teach him, she was immediately asked by another brother if he could be included; a further request soon followed and before we knew what had happened there were too many to take on without the use of some kind of proper facilities. My wife, always the practical one, suggested that since there was such demand we should run a class.

Being no expert, how could I possibly offer help to others? "Easy", she said, "don't"; her idea was that we could offer 'tuition in Social Dancing' in an informal way by demonstrating the steps we use. Being 'half persuaded', I gave it some thought and received approval for the use of the Corby Centre for a mid-week night each week, during the Masonic 'close season', Wednesdays, being the least utilised, were allocated from 7.00pm to 9.00pm.

As I said I am no marvellous exponent of the art, but I know a man who is. Actually two men and their Ladies', I watch them with awe and not a little envy whenever they are on the floor; W Bro Sam Duffy and his wife May and their long time friends, Bro Tom Lumsden also of Ferraria Lodge and his lady Larainne. (May is registered blind and when Sam was asked how she manages to dance so beautifully

despite this, he modestly replied "She is dancing with me, and in any case she is moving backwards most of the time when we are dancing, so it doesn't really make much difference". May just smiled sweetly and said under her breath "A case of the blind leading the blind"; neither is without a sense of humour.)

Both couples, although thinking the idea had merit, were initially wary of taking part as none had ever had a lesson (making six of us), my wife eventually persuaded them that their involvement would add greatly to the chances for success of the venture. The then Steward offered his time free of charge, with the proviso that he be allowed to participate, for although he was great at jive he couldn't do ballroom dancing. Click! We don't jive, so that gave us another demonstrator for later on in the sessions.

You can imagine that it was with a great deal of trepidation that we turned up for the first session but fourteen people plus us, though less than hoped for, gave a nice number to start with. We were not as organised as we might have been, which led to many hilarious incidents, particularly with the music, which was very difficult to find in a suitable form, but this only served to enhance the enjoyment (if you can laugh at yourself you have an inexhaustible source of mirth).
