Message From The PGM/MEGS

Brethren and Companions,

as we emerge from what has been a very wet winter into the spring, the days are starting to get longer with lighter evenings, and spring is threatening to arrive. A time for growth and renewal. As we have been pushing forward with our attraction campaigns, I have been reflecting on what makes us different as an organisation to many others that compete for the attentions of potential candidates and what keeps us engaged within our Lodges and Chapters.

What is it that really distinguishes us from the other fraternal organisations, such as Round Table, Rotary, Lions, and others, and what is it that uniquely binds us together?

I would argue it is our ritual.

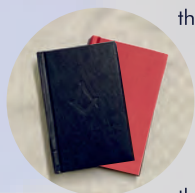
Relief/Charity now

Truth/Respect and Integrity:

Without which we could not function in our Lodges, respecting everyone who tries their hardest. Respecting the time and effort individuals put in to learning their work. Understanding that we are not all the same and some struggle more with ritual whilst others thrive, but it takes more than good ritual to make a good lodge, and there are parts for everyone, some are natural DC's others are Secretaries or Almoners. Each playing their part in their Lodge.

This issue of Password celebrates our ritual, it



includes details of how you can further your learning, both for the ritual specialists who may seek "Silver Matchbox" level ritual or for those who find learning more difficult there are articles on strategies to support the learning and remembering of ritual. We are all different and all bring our individual skills to our Lodges.

I feel I should make mention of the Issues we are facing with the Metropolitan police and other forces across the country in relation to the need for serving officers to register their membership. This is of course a worrying time and unacceptable and unfair to any reasonable thinking person, however we are where we are. UGLE have sought through legal channels to challenge this action and have lost those legal challenges. As such the law has decided that the MPF may continue to request this disclosure of membership. As such and as we have all taken an oath to support the law of our country, we must now comply and I encourage any members needing to make such declarations to do so now in a timely manner. It is fully understandable that there are members amongst us whose careers and therefore their families' livelihood may be affected by these developments. Whilst we hope these actions and views within the Police will not adversely affect any members, and we also hope

it doesn't affect individual memberships, or a Brothers choice to stay a member. I do however understand that should any brother feel that their membership is or will impact upon their career and therefore their family, I for one acknowledge, that they may reluctantly wish to step away for a short period of time. I accept this knowing that they will take the lessons they have learned and the values of Masonry with them through their life and through their career, regardless of whether they are attached or unattached to any particular Lodge. Those who do need to take this action, I hope, will once circumstances permit, return to us when they would be welcomed back with open arms.



On Monday 23rd February I had the great pleasure of presenting RW.Bro Nic Hart with his 60-year service award. Accompanied by my two predecessors and his two successors, RW.Bro's Barrie Hall and Max Bayes, we enjoyed a most convivial afternoon of conversation and tea, remembering historic events in The Province's history, and being

very well supplied with tea and cake by Mrs Val Hart. Also visiting his parents on the day was WBro Ed Hart who many will remember from his days as an active member of Merit and Chetene Lodges in Stamford. Ed is keeping well and practising his masonry in South Wales but reassures us it is not a patch on Northamptonshire and Huntingdonshire.

Wednesday 25th February saw the announcement that the RMBI CC along with the MCF and UGLE have decided to sell, as going concerns, our remaining 15 care homes. As a main board trustee for the RMBICC, I can assure you all that this decision was not taken lightly or easily. With a history of over 180 years of service to our members, such a change was difficult to consider. However, it is the right decision. Our portfolio of homes is of an age where repairs and maintenance are becoming ever more expensive. The nature of the care delivered in registered care homes has changed a great deal and is now much more complex. The regulations become ever tighter and although we are in the top 5% of regulatory outcomes with many homes being deemed Outstanding by the Care Quality Commission, to achieve this level of excellence takes great resources. In addition, rising costs of utilities, food and staff wages mean the cost of high-level care is ever increasing. The model of funding our residents care, when they can no longer contribute, is becoming ever more challenging. With a total number of over nine hundred beds of which we subsidise

almost three hundred individuals care over and above local authority rates, there is again more pressure upon the Charities. This subsidy has become unsustainable in the long term, especially considering all the above cost pressures. In order to offer support which is sustainable and also spread more equitably across the wider membership, and not just in provinces where a physical home exists, this programme of asset disposal will enable us to review our support and work towards a more equitable grant based programme. I recognise there will be members with many questions following this announcement, who may wish to understand it further and I invite them to call me directly and I will be happy to discuss it with them, or if a particular Lodge would like me to visit to explain in more detail please invite me along.

The Royal Arch has had a most successful period with increasing membership and more than doubling the usual number of exaltations over the last 12 months. There were 107 exaltations last year, which of course includes the twenty-six new Companions inducted into



Abingdon Chapter last November. In addition, many other Chapters are holding multiple ceremonies, and I firmly believe this experience in the Royal Arch bonds all Masons together even further. I myself joined the Royal Arch as part of a multiple ceremony with Excellent Companion Ged Dempsey and I believe going through that ceremony together, and waiting outside the door together before going in, has bound us even closer as friends. We have consecrated our new Chapter of Provincial Grand Stewards in the memory of and named after E Comp Wayne Williams past Most Excellent Grand Superintendent. This proved to be a most memorable and successful, and we were joined at the Festive board by Wayne's Widow Jean and family members.

I am looking forward to the two further consecration meetings

later this season, the Chapter of United Services and Sartoris Chapter.

It remains, as it has been for the last few years, still vital for us to continue our drive to increase our membership numbers, with our target of three thousand members not far away, but will demand some serious effort this season and possibly next, to ensure that we achieve it and continue to grow. In addition to multiple ceremonies and working hard at discover freemasonry events and open days, we must also deliver friendship, fun and purpose to all our members, so that each individual feels the unique experience of Freemasonry, and that it continues to be important to them and relevant within their lives, so that individuals value their membership and remain amongst our numbers.

As one member recently summed it all up, we continue: 'with a foot in the past, a purpose in the present and an eye to the future.'

I wish you all well, and may the Great Architect of the Universe care for and guide you all.

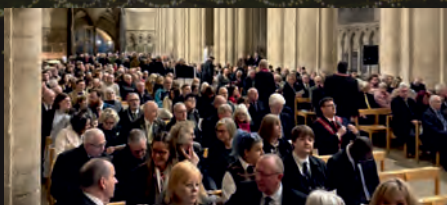

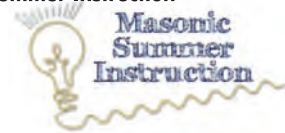

One of my great pleasures in masonry is working with newer Masons in instructing and practising their ritual as they progress towards the chair.

I'm sure many experienced brethren remember their early days in office and being somewhat bewildered by the ritual and learning their roles. A bit of a 'rabbit in the headlights' moment. I feel that Lodges of Instruction (LOI) assist in dimming those headlights a bit. Lodges of Instruction across the Province operate in many different formats, all provide great

assistance to their members. As the preceptor of the Kettering United LOI, it is a pleasure to instruct and assist members in learning their roles and responsibilities across all offices. We make every effort to not only instruct, but also to make it fun. The friendships that develop between brethren from all lodges often continue throughout their masonic career and can only help with engagement and retention. Witnessing the support and teamwork at the LOI evenings between members from various lodges is a real pleasure. Many LOIs have a festival meeting at the end of the season, which are special evenings for all attending.

Summer Instruction



Inevitably, brethren can drift apart during our summer break, with the potential of losing enthusiasm for masonry. In 2024 and 2025 we ran additional evenings to continue with the LOI work. Initially called Summer School, now known as Masonic Summer Instruction, the meetings have proved very popular with brethren from Kettering and other centres. Indeed, meetings were also held in Wellingborough and Rushden for brethren from those areas, again building friendships and bonds between brethren from multiple lodges.

Our meetings were generally held every other week from May to August, and on varying days to allow for

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Welcome to 2026 and a time to reflect...

As we enter the 4th year of our Membership Challenge we can look back on some amazing progress and incredible efforts to bring

reduction in overall membership across the Province in 2025.

The 2024 Membership Challenge graph shows a record number of 173

including a 20% increase in resignations and very sadly a 27% rise in deaths - and we are suddenly faced with a huge swing from +20 to -82 members in 2025.

Our membership age profiles comprise +85 = 7%; +75 = 21%; +65 = 20%; +55 = 23%; +45 and below = 29%

The cost of living crisis continues biting harder than many anticipated and those retired on fixed pension/planned incomes are seeing significant financial strain on their resources with constantly rising costs. The mid age ranges are seeing the same financial strains coupled with ever increasing demands on their time; and finally the youngest element are under the most pressure we have ever seen with housing and living costs, whilst employment practices are perhaps the most challenging seen for many years. So challenging times we live in indeed.

However, our Fraternity has faced far greater challenges - I was privileged to listen to W.Bro William Diggins' lecture recently: "Freemasonry – a journey through hard times" – and his account of wartime masonic persecution and



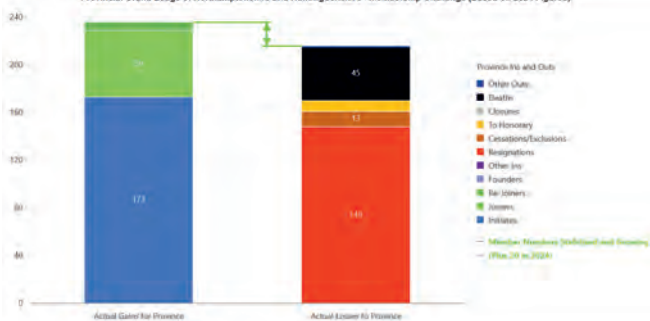
the joy of Freemasonry to the wider community. We continue to see positive Discover Freemasonry initiatives being championed by many Centres and Lodges with great success in attracting new members for those with strong activity plans.

Many Lodges have busy calendars of ceremonies built on the back of their hard work and enthusiasm. However, facts must be faced that the latest data shows a concerning downturn with 2.8%

initiations and a total gain of 236 members. We then factor losses - 148 resignations, 45 deaths & 23 others - this total reduced to a positive gain of only 20 members. Wonderful to have positive growth, but frustrating to see the hard work eroded through these losses.

Now we look at the 2025 Membership Challenge graph and see a 16% reduction to 198 gains with 31 fewer initiations. Balance this with 281 losses

events, holding centre open days to open our doors to the public and to innovate to succeed – there is no magic answer to attracting and engaging members, but co-ordinated and consistent action and sharing successes to help others is key - most importantly to have FUN in every moment so that we can truly enjoy this wonderful fraternity for many years to come.

stoicism in rebuilding our fraternity was inspiring. It shows us that our future is in our hands. Our shared values of Integrity, Friendship, Respect and Service have never been more important... And these values and our determination to succeed are our greatest strength. Our mix of ages brings

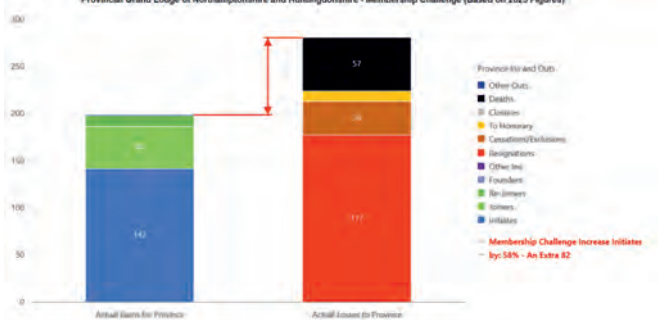

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We begin our report with the amazing news that Buckby Castle Masonic Lodge raised £5,000 for Northamptonshire Domestic Abuse Service (NDAS), and that figure includes support from Province.



NDAS began under the name of Northampton Women's Aid in 1976. Originally staffed by volunteers, the organisation has changed a great deal since then but has continued to dedicate itself to helping and supporting the victims of domestic abuse, campaigning and raising awareness of domestic abuse, and keeping victims and their children safe in Northamptonshire for nearly 50 years.

In addition to providing safe accommodation, they support victims and their children in the community through outreach support, via their advice line and with a range of group work open to clients in their accommodation

and living in the community. In 2024 alone, they supported over 100 families in refuge, answered more than 1,000 calls on their advice line, and provided critical support to hundreds of individuals through group work and outreach – and our money will help them continue this vital work.

Also, W Bro Allen Betts of the Town and Country Lodge raised £400 by selling cannula plants. He presented a cheque for £400



to the Northampton Young Carers team in Wellingborough. Allen is pictured along with W.Bro Mick Warren.

Finally, great news that The Masonic Charitable Foundation (MCF) has awarded a £60,000 grant to Peterborough Women's Aid

in order to fund The E-scape Project, which has two services attached to it. The first is the Healing Together Programme for primary school age children. It lasts 6 weeks and was put together by clinical and trauma informed experts. Each child is allocated an Early Intervention Workers and learn about how their body and brain work together, their feelings, senses and strategies they can use to help their body and brain feel safe. The second is the DAY Programme delivered in secondary schools and Sixth Forms. This is a multimedia programme that uses short films, advertisements, and chart music to raise awareness and provide education about domestic abuse and exploitation. The charity deliver this one to one where appropriate or through assemblies and PSHE sessions. The majority of referrals come through the designated safeguarding lead in schools. The charity explain that they recently widened the reach of the DAY Programme sessions to boys who attend Peterborough United Football Schools and at 'The House' - a project supporting care leavers.

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The Path to Resignations

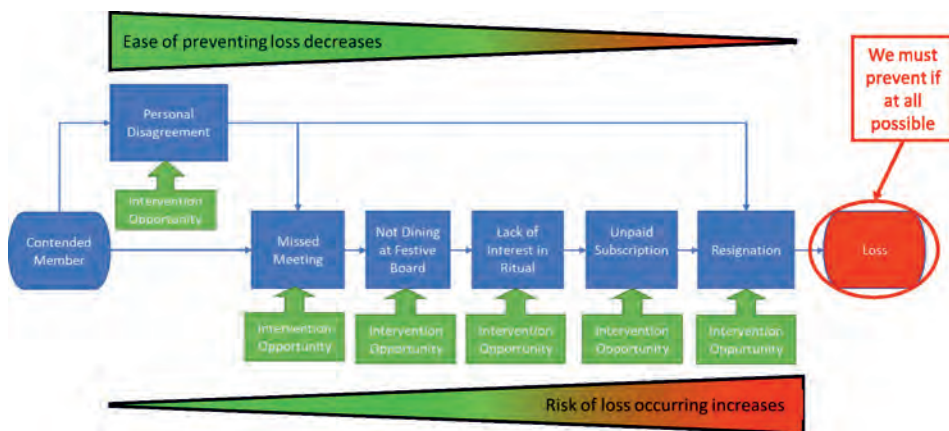
Brethren all, our work in terms of mentoring is to assure that our Brethren are engaged and enjoy their Freemasonry, for the most part we are successful. However, it is the case, that we are, from time to time, unsuccessful and this results in a resignation. It

Clearly this impacts our ability to hit next step 3000.

With the launch of Building Together earlier this year, the Members' Pathway foundations were built upon and certain modifications made to how we look after our members. A key modification was the migration of the

resignation.

Consider a simple process from which a happy and contender Brother may go through before they resign and are lost to the Unit. The figure below shows some of the indicating factors which I explored in the previous article, there could, of course be many more.



is almost never the case that the resignation is wholly unexpected, this MUST be a concern to us all. This is important because as of the time of writing in mid-December 2025, we had lost 152 Brethren to resignation. For context we lost 137 Brethren to resignation in the same period in 2024.

responsibility for managing the risk of resignations within our Units to the role of Lodge Mentor. Indeed I touched on this in my previous article for Password and I make no apology for reintroducing it in this edition. 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A core tenet of Freemasonry is looking after others and our Almoners throughout the world strive to deliver care and support to those in need. In truth, all brethren are Almoners and the following is a wonderful example of how universal that care can be for members and families wherever they may be dispersed.

Bro Paul England, in the middle of the picture, a member of St Peter's Lodge No 442 embarked on a cruise in Canada with his wife Denise on 25th September 2025.

On 1st October, Lodge secretary W.Bro Mick Smith received a phone call from Paul's daughter Debbie, who was distressed and stated her father had been airlifted from his cruise and was now in Clare's Mercy Hospital, St John's, Newfoundland. He was seriously ill and her mother, Denise had been taken to the Holiday Inn, St John's. Debbie asked for help as Denise was finding the situation difficult, with many phone calls from afar and the cost prohibitive.



Mick researched and emailed the Grand Lodge of Newfoundland and Labrador, receiving from Bro Tucker, SW at St John's Lodge No1 a reply that he in turn had involved the Lodge Almoner, MWBro Don Vokey, who was also the Immediate Past Grand Master, and who now intended to visit Bro Paul the next day. However, Paul had by now been moved to another hospital, but RW.Bro Daniel Crocker, the Grand Secretary, picked up the trail and on 3rd October, the wives of local Canadian masons became involved by helping to convey Denise from her hotel to the hospital on a daily basis. This continued for many days and in addition, took Denise for afternoon teas and other support.

By 8th October, Paul's condition had deteriorated and he was now unconscious and intubated. There had been hope of flying Paul home in the immediate future, but this was dashed as he underwent two heart operations. On 30th October, serious concern was expressed that Paul by now was on 'end of life' care and on 4th November, Bro Paul sadly passed to the Grand Lodge Above.

Overall, Denise had been contacted by a local mason on each of the thirty-four days that Paul was in hospital, and on many days, driven to hospital and supported by their wives. Denise and Debbie arrived home on 11th November.

Bro Paul England PPJGD was initiated into St Peter's Lodge in 1995 and despite suffering with health problems for some years, including a prosthetic leg, Paul was an excellent lodge Almoner for St Peter's from 2016 to the time of his death. In 2020, he was honoured to receive a British Citizen Award (BCA) for his exceptional endeavour and charity work that positively impacts communities.

W.Bro Mick Smith, on behalf of St Peter's Lodge has commissioned a set of three oak turned gavels and plates in a presentation chest as a gift to St John's Lodge No1 in appreciation of their efforts and support for Paul and his family. The gavels include engraved tributes to Bro Paul, with the presentation box carrying a separate tribute to St John's. Plans are now being finalised for Mick and Alan Salt (IPM), together with partners Jackie and Sally and Chaplain Tony Rogers all to travel to Canada on 6th June 2026 and make the presentation in person to MW.Bro Don Vokey.

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Community Engagement – 2025 Reflections

In 2025, Community Engagement across the Province continued to grow in both scale and impact, clearly demonstrating the positive effect that Freemasonry has within our communities. During 2025, collectively, we



supported our communities in a range of different way. Northampton and Peterborough hosted blood donation sessions with the National Blood Transfusion Service, helping to provide vital capacity for lifesaving donations. Our outstanding Province wide fundraising efforts raised £175,000 for the proposed Maggie's Centre at Addenbrooke's, as well as additional donations for the Northampton centre. Additionally, we were able to support the Northampton



General Hospital with a £55,000 donation for their HiFU integrated service for treatment of prostate cancer.

Our members volunteered their time and energy in many ways from supporting The Royal British Legion's annual Poppy campaign which generated a tremendous £35,000 for the appeal. serving more than 18,500 meals through Three Pillars Feeding the Homeless, supporting Veterans Community Network events, hosting Open Days, or distributing over 10,000 Teddies for Loving Care (TLC) bears.

Our centres have opened their doors not only to members, but increasingly to the wider public, strengthening relationships and showcasing Freemasonry as an active and caring presence in their communities.

One of the insights from 2025 is the power of personal connection. Many projects began with a single conversation

or an individual member's connection to a local cause. These conversations (and relationships) continue to form the foundation of meaningful and lasting community partnerships.

In 2026, our aim is to build on this foundation. Community Engagement is not about isolated events, but about long term continued involvement, visibility and collaboration within our towns and villages. Every Lodge, centre and member has an opportunity (should they wish to do so) to play a part whether



through volunteering, partnership building, or simply sharing the impact of our efforts.

Understanding Neurodiversity and Support



Neurodiversity is an umbrella term for natural brain variations, with common types including Autism, ADHD, Dyslexia, Dyspraxia and Tourette's syndrome, all affecting how people process information, communicate, and learn. Neurodiverse individuals often demonstrate a range of different strengths, as well as facing a number of challenges. It is common to experience more than one neurodiversity such as ADHD alongside Autism.

In this edition of Password, WBro Greg Bagniuk, Deputy Provincial Grand Director of



Ceremonies has reached out to brothers who live with the day-to-day challenges of neurodiversity, and the impact that this

has had on their experience of learning ritual. **W.Bro Shaun Warren, Membership Officer of Sartoris Lodge** has offered his support to anyone experiencing similar difficulties to his own. He is very candid about his reasons for joining masonry, the challenges he has faced, and the positive impact that masonry has had in his life. The questions he was asked, and his responses, are shown below.

Can you tell me what Neurodiverse conditions you have, and how you first became aware of them.

I was diagnosed when I was around 10 years old with, "Severe ADHD and learning difficulties" I first started to notice symptoms from my diagnosis at an early age. I would frequently hit my head to make myself cry as I was unable to regulate my emotions. Often during my classes I would get into trouble for misbehaviour,

lack of focus and general inability to sit still, every sound and every movement outside of my line of sight I would need to see what the source was without even thinking I'd just react.

What impact did you being neurodiverse have on your decision to become a Mason.

Having had no connections to freemasonry and because of my neurodiversity, I was extremely isolated from friends and family. The decision to join freemasonry stemmed from this, and the longing to find friendships and a social group from which I could grow.

What challenges, or opportunities, has being neurodiverse presented during your time in Masonry.

I would honestly say the biggest challenges I have faced would be my constant need to do right by others whether that is my performance during ritual or my punctuality when attending practices and events. This also includes procrastination when practicing ritual at home due to my ADHD procrastination is a nightmare and the bane to my existence.

However the opportunities in masonry that have been provided to me through the support from my Lodge have been amazing in which the Brethren are always there to provide support whether that's through a phone call or meeting up to go through some ritual in person, this in turn provides me a confidence boost when I feel low and have been avoiding everything. I would also state that the opportunities to meet new people was an amazing surprise to me I have met through the light blues and visiting other lodges some amazing brothers and have made some very close friendships and bonds and I have Freemasonry to thank for this!

What methods do you use to help you learn ritual?

The go to methods that I use due to my ADHD is I like to run through it with other brothers whether that is a

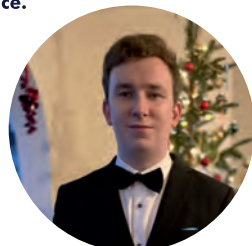
1 on 1 or in a group, the brethren help keep me focused and it actually helps me pick ritual up really quickly. However, if that option is not available, I use reminders and deadlines that I must stick by to keep me focused and on target when an upcoming meeting is due, and I have a piece of work to remember.

There are a range of learning styles which may support neurodivergent individuals:

- Visual learners grasp concepts best with diagrams, charts, and videos.
- Auditory learners learn most effectively through discussions, lectures, and audio materials.
- Kinaesthetic learners benefit from hands-on activities and movement-based tasks.
- Non-linear learners learn at their own pace and in the order that best suits their interests and understanding.

Palmer Court

The Masonic Housing Association (MHA) has just celebrated its 50th birthday having been established in 1975 and offers sheltered accommodation which is primarily for older people who wish to continue independent living. The MHA run 5 sheltered housing schemes across England.



One of MHA's homes, Palmer Court, is located in Wellingborough. Palmer Court consists of 35 self-contained one-bedroom flats across two buildings; the original building which was built in 1984 and the more recently completed wing in 2014. A number of the flats are suitable for couples, offering residents a private space while still benefiting from shared facilities and community support. Many of the current residents are not Freemasons (or do not have a connection to Freemasonry) and we are delighted that so many in our local community are able to live at Palmer Court and enjoy its extensive facilities.

The Palmer Court House Committee is made up of many

Freemasons who generously give up their time and offer their experience to help with the running of the home. Social life at Palmer Court is active and engaging. There are regular events from bingo and coffee mornings to themed garden parties and seasonal celebrations which are organised by the residents themselves with support from staff as well as many of our members.



Devonshire Court

For over 200 years, **The Royal Masonic Benevolent Institution (RMBI)** has delivered the very highest quality residential care, nursing support, and dementia care services. Its network of 15 care homes support over 1,000 older people and has residents from all backgrounds, which while many residents are Freemasons and their families, these homes also offer places to the wider community in which they are located.

As a Province, our Lodges and members offer their

support to our local home, Devonshire Court either in the form of their time or through donations which are used to provide residents for extras such as day trips and similar.

Devonshire Court in Oadby, offers residential and dementia care for up to 69 people who are either permanent residents or staying at the home for a short respite break.

The home has been rated Outstanding by the Care Quality Commission (CQC) for caring, responsiveness, and leadership. This recognition highlights RMBI's commitment to high standards of care, compassionate support, and residents' wellbeing.

It is a source of great satisfaction that residents in our communities have the opportunity to access such high-quality residential care.



The Royal Masonic Benevolent Institution Care Company ("RMBI Care Co") announced on the 25th February 2026 that, following a thorough review, it has reached a decision to sell its portfolio of 15 care homes (the "Homes") it operates across England and Wales and to exit its operations in the residential care sector. Although the company is being sold, it is still available to members and we still hope friends will continue to support the homes as it will be some time before it changes hands.

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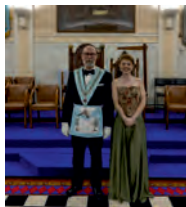


On 22 October 2025, Trinity Lodge No.

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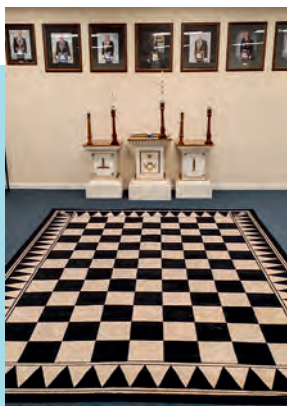


The Corby Masonic Complex

For Brethren who fancy a new challenge... how about pure Emulation Ritual?

Inaugurated in 2025 in our Province, Melius Lodge of Emulation instructs and rehearses pure Emulation Ritual. Our meetings are conducted in the same format as the Emulation Lodge of Improvement (ELol) in London.

ELol is over 200 years old, and it's purpose is to maintain and demonstrate pure emulation ritual in all four ceremonies. ELol meets every Friday at 6.15pm at Great Queen Street, from October to June. Often referred to as the 'Silver Matchbox' Lodge, it's main aim is to rehearse and demonstrate pure Emulation Ritual for all offices. The Silver Matchbox is awarded to any brother who works an entire ceremony from the chair: "without standing in need of prompting or correction in either words or actions". As of December 2025, there have been 369 brethren who have completed this unique achievement.

Our Province has three brethren who hold silver matchboxes, W.Bros Billy Glover, Eddie Storey, and Mark Titterton – all with 'scratches' for more than one ceremony. Mark is now a member of the ELol committee in London.

Eddie, Billy and Mark are the preceptors of Melius and enjoy working with brethren who want to pursue and perfect their emulation ritual. Other committee members include

W.Bros Tony Landon (treasurer), Allen Betts (secretary), and John McGrath (assistant secretary). As Mark Titterton is a 'recognised' preceptor of ELol, Melius is a recognised Lodge of by London for Emulation Ritual. This makes Melius the perfect environment for any brethren wishing to progress their ritual in its pure form.

Melius respects and understands that Lodges have their own customs and variations, there is no intention to alter that. Currently, meetings are held on the third Wednesday in Kettering, with other venues to follow soon.
